Lawrenceburg Community School Corporation COVID-19 Re-Entry Plan

General Overview

Lawrenceburg Community School Corporation's Path to Re-Entry for our PK-12 students provides considerations, recommendations, and best practices to ensure a safe and successful 2020-2021 school year. This guidance is not mandated or state required. Local school districts have the authority and flexibility to meet their individual needs and be responsive to their communities in collaboration with the Dearborn County Health Department. The conditions, current medical landscape, and growing body of knowledge surrounding COVID-19 continues to evolve. This reality presents challenges to planning, preparing, and guiding school operations. **Therefore, expect document revisions accordingly.**

This approach is built upon the guidance and recommendations of health officials. It is aligned to the reopening guidelines that have been provided by our state and federal leaders and it's designed to help prioritize the health and safety of students and staff as we open school buildings and deliver instruction for the 2020-2021 school year.

Lawrenceburg Community School Corporation's mission is to provide academic excellence to all students, to prepare them for post-secondary opportunities in the changing global economy. From full-day kindergarten to rigorous academic courses at the high school, our staff is dedicated to see that learning occurs in a safe, nurturing instructional environment that is focused on the **whole child**: "each student is healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged" which "provides for long-term student success."

The priority for preventing the spread of disease in the school setting is to insist that sick staff and students stay home. Additionally, students and employees should remain home if someone in the household has COVID-19 symptoms or is being tested for COVID-19.



COVID-19 Definitions

Any policy regarding face coverings should be sensitive to the needs of students and staff with medical issues that make the wearing of a face covering inadvisable. Styles of Learning Options

- Option 1: In-Person Learning
 - Definition: Attendance at school 5 days per week, all day and in-person. This will be a traditional style of learning at school, similar to pre-COVID-19 with recommended safety measures.
 - Option 2: Virtual Learning
 - Definition: Instruction will be delivered live, recorded, and through various technology platforms. Parents and students should expect 5-6 hours of instruction each day. Homework, assignments, and extra practice will be in addition to instruction. Parents and students should expect between 1-2 hours of homework each day depending on grade level. Enrollment will be on a semester basis, unless there are extenuating circumstances.
 - IHSAA Guidelines: If a student selects the virtual option, they must comply with any regulations by the IHSAA to participate in any athletic activities.
 - Option 3: Hybrid Learning
 - Definition: “Virtual Learning” option with allowance, as pre-approved by administration, to attend some days in-person.
 - Option 4: eLearning
 - Definition: eLearning is an instructional model that is provided to parents and students when school is closed either school-wide or corporation-wide. eLearning is usually 2-3 hours of work each day, depending on the grade level. It is not as rigorous as our regular instruction model due to the fact that it was not a choice any parent made, rather a set of circumstances requiring the use of eLearning. The skills set developed through this style of education is one that is valued and can be utilized in the future. It is also typically implemented on short notice. Normally, it is not intended for an extended period of time.
 - As an example, we provided eLearning during April and May when Governor Holcomb ordered all schools closed through the end of the 2019-2020 school year.
 - For the 2020-2021 school year, we will provide eLearning if a school or the corporation is closed due to an Executive Order issued by the Governor or if we are directed to close by the local health departments due to an increase in COVID-19 cases.
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Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and Sanitization

- Shields/Masks
 - Staff
 - All staff will be provided a face shield and mask.
 - All staff will have the option to use their own shield or mask.
 - Students
 - All students will be provided a face shield and masks.
 - All students will have the option to use their own shield or mask.
 - Visitors
 - All permitted visitors will be required to wear a face shield or mask.

- Sanitizing Wipes
 - Every classroom and common area in each building will be supplied with sanitizing wipes for use as directed by staff.
 - Hand Sanitizer
 - Every classroom, common area and entry door in each building will be supplied with hand sanitizer.
 - CLOROX T-360 Spraying Machine (On Order)
 - Each building will be supplied with one for a deep cleaning of spaces.
 - School Bus Cleaning
 - School busses will be cleaned twice daily (after AM and PM routes.)
 - School busses will be sprayed with alcohol-based sanitizer between secondary and elementary routes.
 - Activity busses will be cleaned after each use.
 - COMMON SENSE Microbe Solutions
 - Busses will utilize this technology to obtain long term sanitization protection.
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Attendance

- Staff
 - All COVID-19 related absences will be an excused absence (held harmless) for the 2020-21 school year in relation to evaluations.
 - Staff will be entitled to Paid Sick Leave and Expanded Family and Medical Leave under [The Families First Coronavirus Response Act \(FFCRA\)](#).
 - If all sick, personal, and vacation days have been exhausted, the use of unpaid days will be allowed without a consequence, if COVID-19 related.
 - A LCSC Board of Trustees resolution suspending policies, guidelines and forms will be utilized during SY 20-21 for all COVID-19 related situations.
 - Students
 - All COVID-19 related absences will be considered an excused absence (held harmless) for the 2020-21 school year.
 - If a student goes on a mandated exclusion based on COVID-19 restrictions they will be offered eLearning.

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When Student/Family Member or Staff Member Reports Illness

- When a parent calls in for a student, the secretary will ask clarifying questions.
 - If the report does not provide a specific reason (medical diagnosis), then:
 - Ask if student has a fever and/or are other symptoms being experienced
 - If fever, what is the temperature?
 - Have you given any fever reducing medication? If Yes, is the temperature with or without medication?
 - If symptoms, when did they begin? Please list them.

- Are there any other members of your household experiencing COVID-19 symptoms?
 - If a parent gets the school voicemail or sends an email to report a student absence, they will be asked to list symptoms. If they don't, the secretary or nurse will do a follow up call.
 - Staff will answer the sub request form and a COVID-19 question will be added.
 - Sick staff members and children may not return until they have met LCSC criteria to discontinue home isolation.

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When Student, Staff Member or Visitor Becomes Sick

Health Monitoring Protocols:

- Staff, parents/guardians, and students are expected to self-screen for any symptoms prior to arriving at school each day.
 - Self Screening with Symptoms:
 - Students and staff should be excluded from activity/school if they test positive for COVID-19 or exhibit one or more of the symptoms of COVID-19 based on CDC Guidance that is not otherwise explained.
 - Symptoms Impacting Consideration for Exclusion:
 - Fever (100.4 Degrees Fahrenheit or Greater)
 - Chills
 - Cough
 - Shortness of Breath or Difficulty Breathing
 - Fatigue
 - Muscle or Body Aches
 - Headache
 - New Loss of Taste or Smell
 - Sore Throat
 - Congestion or Runny Nose
 - Nausea or Vomiting
 - Diarrhea
 - Return to School After Exclusion: Once a student or staff is excluded from the school environment, they may return if they satisfy the recommendations of the CDC and Indiana Department of Health: [Student Guidance for Return to School](#). Currently those guidelines are:
 - **Untested:** Persons who have not received a test proving or disproving the presence of COVID-19 but experience symptoms may return if the following three conditions are met:
 - They have not had a fever for at least 72 hours (that is three full days of no fever without the use of medicine that reduces fevers); and
 - Other symptoms have improved (for example, when your cough or shortness of breath have improved); and
 - At least 10 calendar days have passed since your symptoms first appeared.
 - The state website has a list of over 200 testing facilities, their location, and hours of operation. This list is updated frequently.

- Advise sick staff members and children not to return until they have met LCSC criteria to discontinue home isolation.
 - Inform those who have had close contact to a person diagnosed with COVID-19 to stay home and follow state guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate LCSC guidance for home quarantine.
 - All decisions will be based off of the [COVID-19 Screening Decision Tree](#) and [Student Guidance for Return to School](#) as directed by the Dearborn County Health Office.

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Transportation

- Transportation will be available to those **who can not provide their own transportation.**
 - Please note transportation on the bus will look similar to pre-COVID-19 except the following:
 - Students will be asked to sit with siblings if possible.
 - All students are **strongly recommended required** to wear masks.
 - Students will have assigned seats on the bus.
 - Procedure: Students will be assigned seats on the bus as they board in the mornings. For GMS/LHS students, we will begin with the seats in the back of the bus and fill seats towards the front, to limit student exposure. For LPS/CES students, we will begin filling LPS students in the front (beginning with the second row) of the bus and CES students in the back of the bus. Bus Aides will ride the busses the first few days to assist with the organization of assigned seats.
 - Social distancing will be applied as much as possible.
 - Morning Arrival: Students will be released from busses individually to promote social distancing.
 - Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Sanitizing wipes will be available for students and bus drivers as needs arise.
 - **Strongly recommend Require** students and staff to wear face masks/coverings while in large group gatherings.
 - No field trips.
 - Inspecting busses prior to students returning and as part of a regular rotation.
 - Airing out busses when not in use.
 - Riding a different route should only be approved in emergency situations.
 - School Bus Cleaning
 - School busses will be cleaned twice daily (after AM and PM routes.)
 - School busses will be sprayed with alcohol-based sanitizer between secondary and elementary routes.
 - Activity busses will be cleaned after each use.
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Entering and Arrival to School Buildings

- Everyone is **strongly recommended required** to wear masks; however, anyone entering the building may be asked to remove their mask for identification purposes (including students entering in the morning).

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff.
 - Limit unnecessary congregations of students and staff.
 - Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread:
 - COVID-19 symptoms.
 - Preventative measures (including staying home when sick).
 - Good hygiene.
 - School/district specific protocols.
 - Establish a protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school (see When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School).
 - Establish a protocol for visitors: calling the front office before entering, screening visitors, removal of masks while practicing social distancing to be identified for school safety purposes, requesting use of face coverings/masks, and entering the quarantine location, etc.
 - No admittance of unessential visitors.

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Food Service (Breakfast and Lunch)

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Providing hand sanitizer for students and staff.
 - **Strongly recommend Require** students and staff to wear face masks/coverings while in large group gatherings.
 - Conducting cleaning of cafeterias and high-touch surfaces throughout the school day.
 - Students who qualify for free and reduced meal plans and select the “Virtual Learning” option may be offered meal pick up services.

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Transitioning

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - **Strongly recommend Require** students and staff to wear face masks/coverings while in large group gatherings.
 - Conducting cleaning of hallways and high-touch surfaces throughout the school day.
 - Designating areas of the hallway (i.e. lanes) to walk to keep students separated (to the extent practicable).
 - Schools will comply with state requirements for all required drills (tornado, fire, active shooter, bus evacuation, etc.) using social distancing to the best of our ability.
 - **See Appendices for specific building procedures.**
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Supporting Teaching and Learning

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Providing hand sanitizer for students and staff.
 - Conducting cleaning of classrooms and high-touch surfaces multiple times each day.
 - Limiting physical interaction through partner or group work.
 - Surveying families' interest in continuing online learning to reduce the number of students requiring face-to-face, traditional instruction.

 - Establish an academic baseline:
 - Administer formative assessments toward the start of the school year.
 - NWEA K-10
 - AIMSweb Plus K-5
 - Evaluate the social emotional well-being of students:
 - Social workers and Guidance will use [Road Map for SEL Re-Entry](#)
 - Target interventions and supports:
 - Provide additional instructional supports to:
 - Students at-risk of not graduating on time.
 - Students with disabilities.
 - Students who struggled in the prior distance/remote learning environment (i.e. early grades, English Learners, etc.).
 - Other students identified as being behind academically by teachers and parents.
 - Identify essential concepts/skills grade levels and provide access to enrichment.
 - Address learning loss:
 - Help students catch up/get ahead.
 - Provide extended learning opportunities through after school programs.
 - IHSSA Requirements will be followed for participating in all activities. If a student is participating in extracurricular activities, students are still required to be a part of the drug testing program and if selected will have to come in to take the test.
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Large Group Gatherings

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Providing hand sanitizer for students and staff.
 - **Strongly recommend Require** students and staff to wear face masks/coverings.
 - Limiting unnecessary congregations of students and staff.
 - Follow Lawrenceburg Community School Corporation 2020-2021 Athletic Participation Guidelines.
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Fragile Populations

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
 - Establish a point-of-contact with the local health department (Dr. Eliason).
 - Identify local COVID-19 testing sites.

- Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff.
 - Allow vulnerable students to complete their coursework virtually.
 - Strongly recommend vulnerable students and staff to wear PPE throughout the school day (to extent practicable). Provide PPE to vulnerable students and staff as appropriate.
 - Identify and establish a process for regular check-ins with vulnerable students and staff.
 - Allow an early transition for vulnerable students to go to classes.
 - Limit large group gatherings/interactions for vulnerable students and staff.
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Government Orders/Updates

- **Face Covering Requirement:** Per Executive Order 20-37 effective July 27-August 26, 2020, face coverings (include face masks that cover the mouth and nose and are secured in a manner where the mask is close to the face and face shields which are clear plastic and covers the nose and the mouth) are required:

- inside a business, public building, or other indoor places open to the public; an outdoor public space when it is not possible to maintain six feet of social distancing from another person; or when using public transportation or in a taxi, private car service, or ride-sharing vehicle.

The Executive Order 20-37 includes requirements for school corporations as follows:

- All students in Grades 3 through 12, all teachers, all staff members, all vendors, all contractors, all volunteers, and all visitors must be required to wear face coverings while physically present in school buildings and facilities and on school grounds. This directive continues until it is rescinded or modified by the Governor.
 - Exemptions to this requirement include persons with certain medical conditions, are deaf, and the person who is less than 2 years old.
- All students, all teachers, all staff members, all vendors, all contractors, all volunteers, and all visitors are required to wear face coverings while on a school bus or other school-sponsored mode of transportation. Exemptions for this requirement are:
 - Food Consumption: while eating and drinking
 - Faculty/Staff Areas: Faculty and staff while working together in a room, office, or place where social distancing of 6 feet or more from each other may be maintained. This does not apply to when staff is preparing food or meals.
 - Children Between the Ages of 2 and 8: Face coverings are not required UNLESS on a school bus or other school-sponsored transportation. Otherwise, strongly encouraged for students in this age group to wear a face covering.
 - Classroom Settings: When classrooms are arranged for students to be six feet or more apart at all times. When the teacher can be six feet or more away from students, the teacher does not have to wear a face covering, when students cannot be arranged six feet apart.

- Recess: When social distancing of six feet or more can be maintained, face coverings are not required.
 - Extracurricular Activities/Co-Curricular Activities: Students, teachers, instructors, directors, coaches, trainers, volunteers, and any other personnel when engaged in strenuous physical activity or can maintain social distancing of six feet or more.
