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About Me:

I am a 25-year-old born and raised Guernsey local. I studied at St Sampson's and the Grammar Sixth Form, obtained a law degree from Sussex University and trained as a barrister in the UK. As a legal professional, I worked as a County Court advocate and then became legal assistant to a leading London barrister. Having returned to Guernsey, I now work on a major infrastructure project as Project Feasibility Manager for the Guernsey Development Agency.

If elected, my priorities will be: keeping our next generations onisland, rebuilding trust in the States and delivering on urgent policy areas, like housing, through a common manifesto.

Why I'm Standing

I want to bring a fresh perspective to the States - as someone who has a deeply personal stake in Guernsey's biggest challenges - like housing, the rental market, our neglected infrastructure and how our financecentred economy will adapt in an era of AI and rapid technological innovation.

While I have been fortunate enough to return, many of my generation are leaving Guernsey because they feel there is no other choice. I am standing to help make Guernsey a place where all of our young people have the opportunity to build their futures.



My Musts

Deputies must be able to disagree agreeably - personality politics cannot get in the way of Guernsey's best interests any longer.

Guernsey must invest in its future. Long-term economic growth will only be achieved by consistent and considered investment in our infrastructure.

To do this, we must create a fairer and more sustainable tax system, one that ensures business and high net worth individuals pay their fair share before a consumption tax (such as GST) is imposed on islanders.

Keeping Our Next Generations On-Island



Swathes of young people are leaving Guernsey, brought about by the cost of housing, a shrinking rental market and the States' chronic under-investment in our island. Unless we stop this trend, Guernsey will suffer a long-term economic and social decline. I will therefore support:

Backing first time buyers by implementing
the 'Additional Earned Allowance'.

Stabilising the rental market, by increasing the supply of rental properties and setting out clear rights for landlords and tenants.

Reforming our university grant system to incentivise young people to bring their skills back home.

I commit to meeting with the students of our schools and colleges regularly to ensure the next generation's voice is always heard by and represented in the States.

Rebuilding Trust



Trust between the States and the islanders it serves has broken down. Without trust, government cannot deliver. The States needs to earn it back. I will therefore support:

Enacting a freedom of information law. Giving islanders a right to know what our government does and how it spends our money.

Visually broadcasting and livestreaming States debates to improve transparency, incentivise better conduct, and open up the democratic process to a new audience.

Implementing a five-term limit for deputies. The role of deputy should be a calling, not a career. Term limits would create a focused, fresher and more effective States.

How To Get It Done?

We cannot afford to gamble another four years on 38 individual deputies, all pulling in different directions. We have to do something different. Forward Guernsey aims to strike a balance to have real cohesion on islanders' top policy priorities (e.g. housing and tax) while honouring the States' tradition of independent deputies.

TACKLING THE HOUSING CRISIS

An 'Additional Earned Allowance' for all over 16 year-olds on the first £100,000 of their taxable earnings before the age of 30, saving up to £20,000 in tax to go towards a house deposit or eligible pension scheme.

Empowering developers to build more affordable houses for first-time buyers by creating a new 'intermediate' category of affordable housing (by using planning covenants to lock-in a 30% discount on market value).

Increasing the capacity of the building sector by growing our own local talent, for example by pioneering the 'Design, Engineer, Construct' pathway in local secondary schools, **enabling young people to enter the construction industry.**

Ending homelessness by providing emergency housing and creating clear pathways out of homelessness.

STRENGTHENING GUERNSEY'S ECONOMY FOR EVERYONE

Investing to ensure reliable and affordable inter-island and UK sea and air connectivity.

Enabling islanders returning to Guernsey to work in public services with a 'Welcome Home' relocation package equal to that for non-locals.

Allowing private investment and expertise in public infrastructure projects, such as the Guernsey Development Agency's plans for the redevelopment of the St Sampson's Harbour area, delivering these projects faster and more cost-effectively.

HARNESSING OUR CLIMATE TRANSITION

Accelerating the completion of an offshore wind farm, that will also generate new revenues, improve energy security, create high paying jobs and deliver cheaper energy.

Investment in green skills and training to ensure that the whole community benefits from a net zero future.

Using natural solutions like coastal defences and flood protection to **mitigate the impact of climate change on the island.**





CREATING A FAIRER TAX SYSTEM & BALANCING THE BOOKS - IN 6 STEPS

STEP 1. Strengthening Guernsey's economy for everyone (see previous page).



STEP 2. **Delivering more efficient public services,** including an annual 1% reduction in baseline spending, saving £25 million each year by 2029.

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STEP 3. **Sensible and sustainable public investment** by reviewing the capital programme (within 3 months) to prioritise it, so that cashflow, funding requirements and timeframes can be properly managed.



STEP 4. **Fixing our broken tax administration**, including removing the requirement to file income tax returns for the majority of taxpayers whose earnings have already been taxed at source.

STEP 5. **Improving corporate taxes**, including working with Jersey to increase the zero/ten rate of tax to zero/fifteen and fairly taxing personal investment holding companies.

STEP. 6 Wholesale tax reform to **create a fairer tax system for low and middle earners**, (including the Additional Earned Allowance and a Guernsey Property Savings Account).



HEALTHCARE: FASTER ACCESS, FEWER BARRIERS



Making mental health a priority by appointing a political lead as Mental Health Champion to work across government and with the charity sector.

Focusing on key issues that matter to the community, such as the cost and **accessibility of repeat prescriptions for long-term health conditions.**



Focus on retaining local staff by ensuring they feel appreciated, supported, and properly remunerated.

L EDUGATION AND SKILLS FOR ALL ISLANDERS

Fast-tracking the primary review to **improve standards**, **ease teacher workloads**, **and streamline the system**. This will also free up funds to invest in other priorities such as special educational needs and improving maths outcomes.



As new technologies, such as AI, change our world, **we need a responsive education system that enables everyone to continue learning** by introducing opportunities to help adults upskill. While also ensuring our Population Management policy is linked to remaining skills gaps.



Investing in pastoral staff to provide prompt support to students when needed, enabling teachers to teach and benefitting all students.
