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t's no real surprise that David comes here as often as he . can. It's almost a family tradition. His mother was born in Newport's Hunnyhill, his brother ran a pub in Shanklin and he was born just across the water in Portsmouth. Sadly, the Coronavirus put an end to him spending a few weeks working on the south coast. He was due to appear in the Chichester Festival Theatre's production of The Life Of Galileo. This was obviously cancelled, which was a major disappointment for him. In fact, his career had started as a stage hand in a play called Armstrong's Last Goodnight at the Sussex theatre. The cast included Albert Finney.

Via the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School, David has gone on to a very satisfying career. Luckily, he has made his mark in the vastly different worlds of stage acting, television and movies.

"I have been fortunate but I have never planned anything. Ŵithout being pompous, my ambition has always been to just be good at what I do," said David.

In the early days of his career, he worked with budding star, Ian McKellen, with the Prospect Players and later joined the Royal Shakespeare Company.

His early TV appearances included playing DI George Resnick in Widows, which gave his small screen career a major boost. Star Cops, now considered a cult show by sci-fi fans, was a series that David considers the BBC should have done more with. It never reached its true potential.

Following guest appearances in all the major shows, from Cracker, via Boon and Bergerac, he was suddenly in the brilliant hit series Bramwell. He was cast as Dr Robert Bramwell, alongside his on-screen daughter Eleanor, played by Jemma Redgrave. That was compelling viewing and ran for four series.

Actually, his character went missing from the last series, which was only two episodes, and no-one knew where he'd gone.

His appearance as Sir Robert King in the Bond movie, The World is Not Enough, was rather unique.

Many of his television roles have been as tough guys. In the early days it was coppers. For many years he was never considered for comedy roles. He is delighted this has now changed and it's due to his appearances in Motherland, Inside No. 9 and Plebs.

In complete contrast, he was cast as an Alzheimer's patient in Call The Midwife. It was a stunning and emotional performance. He is a great admirer of the series and how they create the past history of the NHS.

A London cabbie once summed up David's life as an actor. He said: "It's you, isn't it? You're one of those unsung heroes. Everybody knows your face but not your name." In reality, David quite liked that. 3


THE JOHN HANNAM INTERVIEW

Ye Olde Village Inn presents BACKYARD FEST

With years of festival experience behind him, building bars at festivals across the world, landlord Jay Chapman decided that to survive post-coronavirus, he needed to come up with something completely new, using the space that they did have. And so, the Olde Village Inn Backyard Fest was born.

s one of the oldest pubs on the Island — Ye Olde Village Inn has been serving the Bembridge community and beyond since 1787. Incredibly

popular with Islanders, the family-run, innovative pub won the recent Isle of Wight Radio Pub of the Year Award. Shortly after the awards ceremony in February, Covid-19 hit and things drastically changed for the hospitality industry.

Being a historical building and one of the oldest coaching houses left on the Island, the Olde Village Inn realised that, with social distancing, the pub would only be only able to serve 19 customers which just wasn't viable.

With just weeks to turn their business around, Jay, wife Kelly along with their business partner Emma — and the help of local tradespeople and a willing army of volunteers — totally transformed the car park into an amazing outdoor area, with social distancing and There are 20 areas available for pre-bookings.



sanitisation at the heart of it. For weeks they worked hard to create a space which would allow them to keep trading — and the doors re-opened on Saturday, 4th July.

So what can you expect from the OVI Backyard Fest? The whole experience is designed to offer a safe, sanitised and sociallydistanced environment so that groups of people in their 'bubbles' can enjoy socialising again. There are 20 areas available for prebookings. From VIP pods with your own fridge, to booths in an undercover outdoor area.

Your host will welcome you on arrival, take your details for track and trace and then show you to your pre-booked area. All areas have hand sanitiser in them and food and drinks can be ordered by the OVI app or via your host — so there's no crowded bar and all drinks and food will be delivered by tray. The whole area will also be sanitised at 90 minute intervals.

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Summer TREATS

With summer in full swing, Gillian Reay-Young shares these recipes for family paella and sorbet to enjoy in the sun



Paella

INGREDIENTS

8 mussels 100g (3½ oz) peeled prawns 1 small cooked lobster 600g (⅓ lb) diced chicken breasts (pork, or a mixture of pork and chicken works well too) 4 tbsp olive oil 2 cloves of garlic, chopped 1 onion, chopped 1 red or green pepper, chopped and seeded 4 tomatoes, peeled and chopped 350g (¾ lb) long grain rice 1.31 (2¼ pints) chicken stock 100g (3½ oz) peas (frozen are fine) A little saffron and seasoning

METHOD

- **1** Heat two tablespoons of oil. Shell most of the mussels and peel most of the prawns (if using fresh), leaving a few for decoration later.
- **2** Remove the cooked lobster meat from the shell and dice.
- **3** Put the oil in a large paella dish or frying pan and sauté the garlic, onion and pepper for five minutes until soft but not browned.
- **4** Add the chopped tomatoes and the diced meat. Lightly brown the meat.
- **5** Stir in the rice and most of the stock, leaving a little to blend the saffron powder before adding to the mixture. Season to your taste (if you use stock cubes, then a little salt will be needed).
- **6** Bring the mixture to the boil, then reduce and simmer for approximately 20 minutes, until the rice is just cooked and the meat tender.
- **7** Stir in the mussels, peeled prawns, lobster meat and peas, and simmer for a further eight to ten minutes.
- 8 Serve the paella with a few strips of raw red/green pepper and scatter a few whole cooked prawns and cooked mussels in their shells over the top.
- **9** Serve indoors or alfresco, with a mixed salad and perhaps some garlic bread.

GIN & TONIC SORBET

INGREDIENTS

170g (6 oz) of caster sugar Zest and juice of 2 limes 6 tbsp of gin 425ml (3/4 pint) tonic water (NOT diet) Fresh lime and mint to decorate

METHOD

1 Dissolve the sugar in 425ml (3/4 pints) of water over a moderate heat.

- 2 Stir in the juice, zest and skin of lime and boil for five minutes until reduced.
- 3 Put to one side to cool, then squeeze out the peel and strain.
- 4 Mix in the tonic water and gin and put the liquid into a freezer container (I use an old ice cream carton) and freeze.
- 5 When frozen, take out of the carton and beat until it goes creamy in texture,

then return to the freezer until you're ready to serve.
Serve in a glass with a little grated lime peel and a spray of fresh mint. Of course, alcohol does not freeze, so the more gin you put in, the more slushy it will be. However, it does have a wonderfully fresh taste!

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WARM UP WIGHT

Island homes to benefit from energy scheme

Thousands of homes on the Isle of Wight could benefit from a new and improved energy efficiency scheme.

Warm Up Wight has been operating since 2016 and aims to help householders on the Island to access a range of energy efficiency measures that could help to make their homes warmer and cheaper to heat.

The qualification criteria for the scheme has now been widened meaning many more people that may have missed out in the past could now qualify, including those on low incomes or properties that are hard to heat.

The scheme is operated by heating and insulation company J&J Crump & Sons Ltd and supported by the Isle of Wight Council, Cllr Steve Hastings, Cabinet Member for Procurement, Waste Management, Special Projects and Forward Planning, said: "Fuel poverty is still a real issue on the Isle of Wight, and as energy prices rise, those living in homes without sufficient energy-efficiency measures in place are often hit the hardest.

"We know that following the Covid-19 lockdown, many homes will be facing the reality of a reduced income whilst their fuel bills are likely to increase as a result of being at home all the time. This is an ideal time to do what we can to help people make their homes warmer and cheaper to heat."

Under this new scheme, thousands of homes on the Island will be eligible to apply for a range of energy efficiency measures, such as cavity wall insulation, loft insulation, room in the roof insulation and in some cases replacement boilers or new heating systems.

"We know that there are tens of thousands of homes on the Island that could still benefit from insulation and heating measures, said Steve Crump, MD of JJCrump.

"Our teams will be out on the streets soon and residents will receive a letter through their doors which will provide more information about the scheme, list the eligibility criteria and the various ways in which they can apply. For many residents, the energy efficiency measures will be free.

"While the weather is warmer, there's no better time to prepare their homes for the winter months and the colder conditions, and we would encourage anyone who thinks they may be eligible under the scheme to get in touch." ^① For more information about Warm Up Wight or to register interest, please visit www.jjcrump.com/warm-up-wight

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Participating in the Government's Eat Out to Help Out scheme with a discount of 50% of up to £10 per head throughout August

Eat out in August for half the price

In August, everyone in the country will be given an 'eat out to help out' discount — 50% off at participating restaurants, cafes and pubs.

"Meals eaten at any participating

business, Monday to Wednesday, will be 50% off, up to a maximum discount of £10 per head for everyone, including children," said Chancellor, Rishi Sunak.

Businesses will then be able

to claim the money back, with funds in their bank account within five working days. The scheme, described as the first of its kind, is designed to help an industry employing 1.8 million people.

Springfield, Lonnie Donegan and The Animals have graced its stage — while the cinema has seen all manner of cinematography, through 35mm film, which had to be threaded through cogs and pulleys, CinemaScope and the periscope method, before digital took over in 2013.

Built in place of the old Sweetmans brewery, the auditorium originally had a capacity of 1,507 seats and housed live shows on a sunday night.

Islander, Shirley Stallard said on Facebook: "Saturday morning pictures were sixpence in the 1940s. They used to take a photo of the queue each week and a lucky person was circled to win a prize the next week (an ice lolly). I never won but I did win a ticket to the pantomime by writing an essay, in about 1950! I remember Tchaicovsky being played waiting for the film shows to start, my first real experience of classical music. The 50s brought Skiffle in the ballroom and shows in the theatre featuring famous pop singers. Great memories!"

ZFTI

Former projectionist, Godfrey Tier, said: "I remember visiting my uncle in the projection room when I was about five. And my aunty was a waitress in the restaurant, which is how they met. Forty years later, I was chief at The Commodore...in the same projection box as my uncle was in the sixties."

Jeffrey Morris said on cinematreasures. org in 2011: "I've a fond memory of visiting this cinema back in 1969/1970 while on a family holiday in Ryde. My sister and I went along to the Saturday morning picture show, we sat through a Children's **Film Foundation** programme with a packed auditorium, presumably a mixture of local children alongside us holidaymakers. There

was no bingo then the entire cinema was a single screen operation. It is hard to imagine it as a three screen cinema with bingo in the original stalls."







New country park in Nicholson Road, Ryde

15 acres of greenfield land is now available to the Ryde community, to form a new country park in Nicholson Road, Ryde. This will enable residents to exercise and enjoy the countryside, whilst socially distancing, on their doorstep.



Ryde East and Ryde South IW Ward Councillors Michael Lilley and Charles Chapman have campaigned for some years for part of the proposed Nicholson Road development site to be used as a small country park. There has been a lack of accessible green space in the area and the proposed park is within a part of the site that is unsuitable to build on. During Covid-19, the need for safe accessible recreational and exercise space has become a real issue for residents.

Ryde Town Council since March 2020 and during lockdown has been lobbying the IW Council, in partnership with Natural Enterprise, to open up the site. This has now been achieved and the site is now officially open.

The Town Council would like to thank Natural Enterprise for their hard work in getting the site open to the public so quickly and thank the IW Council for allowing these plans to go ahead.

Local residents will be asked for ideas to name the park and Natural Enterprise will be launching a consultation with the local community to develop the area further. This will include establishing a volunteer group to care for the site, to work with them on projects to improve it, and protect the important nature on site.

Great news for Network Ryde



A grant has been awarded from HWCAF for laptops to enable the full Network Ryde

staff team to continue to create and deliver online services from their homes. Network Ryde, Ryde Town Councils Youth Service, usually provides youth work sessions from their youth café, 147, for young people aged 13-19 years.

In light of the Coronavirus pandemic they have had to adapt their services, closing their doors temporarily to its Youth Café premises and seeing the staff work remotely from home, providing an innovative and creative online Virtual Youth Club where they can continue to promote and support the young people who normally access the services. The virtual youth club runs daily sessions through its social media accounts incorporating parts of its normal curriculum, fun activities and a weekly young person take over session which is designed and led by young people.

Pedestrian Precinct update

A Traffic Order is in force banning all traffic from driving or parking in the pedestrian precinct seven days a week. Deliveries to businesses are permitted between 6am and 10am. There are loading bays in Garfield Road and Minghella Square and access to Anglesey Street is now from George Street.

Creating a cancer-free tomorrow for the children of today

We are delighted to announce the opening of two new Caring Cancer Trust shops in Ryde High Street. Caring Cancer Trust provide Way2Go programmes, meaning



they can offer special healing holidays of adventure, art and music workshops for local children recovering from cancer. Enabling them to regain their self-confidence and re-ignite their passion for life after the trauma of their illness and lengthy treatment. Generating funding for animal-free research into cancer causes, cancer treatment and cancer prevention. The Caring Cancer Trust are able to provide comforts and amenities for children suffering from cancer and support for their caring parents and siblings, as well as providing emergency funds for amenities, equipment and facilities to adult cancer sufferers.

Caring Cancer Trust opened 165 High Street on Friday 3rd July which Adrian Axford Deputy Mayor officiated with the charity's chairman Chris Ody. The Caring Cancer Trust thrift shop is selling second-hand children's and adult clothes, bric-a-brac, china and glassware, books/CDs/DVDs and toys.

The Boutique shop at 138 High Street opened the week before on Monday 22nd June. The boutique complements the Trust's thrift shop, selling donated antiques, jewellery, spiritual artefacts, arts and crafts handmade by supporters and fragrances.

Caring Cancer Trust has been totally run by unpaid volunteers since 2008. With unsalaried officers,

trustees and patrons working hands-on to provide support for local children with cancer and their caring families, with an operational range that covers the Isle of Wight and southern England.

In May 2019, when I was elected Mayor of Ryde, I could not have envisaged that by the end of my year in office the country would be facing the biggest crisis since the Second World War. This report highlights some of Ryde Town Council's achievements in this eventful year.

Supporting the Community and Voluntary Sector

In the course of this year, I have learnt that what I love most about our 'Town on the Beach' is the wonderful sense of community. The Council has supported this in various ways. We have:

Provided more than £250,000 in grants and support to over 30 Ryde community organisations

Co-funded with the IW Council a post of Community Connector, based at Aspire Ryde, to strengthen community services, especially for the town's most vulnerable residents

Facilitated the establishment of Ryde Unite, a group of community organisations who are now working together to support the town's community and voluntary sector.

Promoting our Arts and Culture

One of the Council's roles is to support and promote our arts and cultural activities. Ryde is a carnival town and we love a street parade. In 2019:

Ryde Carnival was voted the most popular carnival in the UK

Our Mardi Gras festival celebrated the Island's award of UNESCO Biosphere status

The town hosted many other events, including IW Pride, the Scooter Rally, a beach sports festival and the vintage Car Extravaganza.

Supporting the Next Generation

The Council has continued to run its award-winning youth service, Network Ryde. My 2019-20 Mayoral Appeal was to raise funds for the emotional well-being of young people in the town and monies raised have gone initially to Network Ryde projects.

Regenerating our town centre and saving our historic buildings

Ryde also has a rich architectural heritage. In late 2019 the Council, with support from IW Council, Ryde Business Association and other community organisations, won a prestigious award from Historic England to regenerate the High Street. This is the start of a radical programme to regenerate our town centre. We are also working with Natural Enterprise to reopen Appley Tower and exploring ways of bringing the Ryde Theatre/Town Hall back into community ownership.

Taking over Ryde Harbour and rejuvenating the Esplanade

The Council is finalising negotiations with IW Council to take over the ownership and management of Ryde Harbour and adjacent parts of Eastern Gardens for £1. The Town Council has plans to invest in the Harbour over the next five years to improve facilities for both permanent berth holders and visiting yachtsmen. The plans for improvement include, adding additional berths, installing WIFI and electrical hook ups on the pontoons. The IW Council would otherwise have sold the harbour to a private buyer.

Responding to the Covid-19 emergency

During the Covid-19 outbreak, the Council has worked with Aspire Ryde, other local organisations and the IW Council to support vulnerable residents and the community as a whole. We have: • Enrolled 151 volunteers, who have supported 160 vulnerable people • Delivered about 700 prescriptions, 600 food parcels and 620 frozen meals • Provided regular emotional wellbeing support by phone to 30 people • Run a virtual youth club • Liaised with the IW Council and Ryde Business Association to ensure the safe reopening of the town.

Ryde Place Plan

In consultation with other local organisations and the general public, the Council has produced the Ryde Place Plan. The Plan (available on our website) provides a vision of our town's future and a road map for achieving this vision. It has recently been updated to take account of the implications of Covid-19.

Organisational change to manage change in Ryde

There have been a number of organisational and staffing changes during the year. We have:

- Appointed a new Town Clerk, Lisa Dyer, to lead our committed and enthusiastic staff team
- Recruited new staff, reorganised the staffing structure and made efficiency savings
- Held a strategic planning workshop and begun the preparation of a Corporate Plan
- Operated as many of our services as possible remotely during the Covid-19 crisis

The Year Ahead – 2020-21 Investment and Growth

Due to the Covid-19 crisis, the Council had to postpone its 2020 AGM until May next year, which means that I am continuing as Mayor for another year. We have an exciting year ahead. Thanks to the restructuring made in 2019/20, we have approved an ambitious budget for 2020/21 without any increase in the precept, and we have adequate reserves and an energised staff team. We are therefore well placed to continue implementing the projects begun in the last year and to achieve the vision set out in the Ryde Place Plan.

Thank you all

I have been honoured to be Mayor in the past tumultuous and dramatic year and I wish to thank all the Ryde Town Council staff, councillors, all the Covid-19 local volunteers, community organisations, faith groups, businesses and most importantly Ryde's residents. You all make Ryde the wonderful and special place it is and will make it great in the future. Mountbatten appeals to public over dodgy donations

Bin bags with cotton buds, sofas with faeces, and boxes with mice droppings are all things that have been 'donated' to Mountbatten charity shops, leading to the charity appealing for people to be sensible when giving away their goods.

Mountbatten is urging the community not to drop off or take their generous donations to their local charity shop as they reopen across the Island.

After an overwhelming increase in the number of donations, and because of changes to the way donations can be processed, they can only be received by the team at Mountbatten's Warehouse on Newport's Riverway Industrial Estate. Although the warehouse is open for donations seven days a week, between 10am and 4pm (closed between 12 and 1pm), there have been a number of times when capacity has been reached within a couple of hours of opening.

Mountbatten Retail Area Manager, Jodie Wilmott, said: "We've been receiving in just two hours of opening what we would normally receive in a day, with people queuing in their cars to drop off donations.

Sometimes, by the time we reach lunchtime, we are in the position of having to turn people away. We are so grateful for donations that

we can sell to support our work, and we know it can be frustrating when people want to give us their high quality donations, but we only have a limited space in which to store them in quarantine for 72 hours."

The charity is also asking people to ensure donations are of saleable quality. Since the easing of lockdown restrictions, a large percentage of what is currently being donated cannot be sold on through Mountbatten's shops.

Jodie added: "Unfortunately, that means we have to divert money away from supporting our wide range of end of life and bereavement services and into the cost of getting rid of what we can't sell to raise funds.

"Among the items we've received are sofas with animal faeces on them, bin bags containing cotton buds and other potentially

Chris Packham launches Big Butterfly Count

Isle of Wight Zoo ambassador and TV presenter, Chris Packham, is launching this year's Big Butterfly Count.

With millions of people gaining comfort through nature during the lockdown, the TV naturalist believes the Big Butterfly Count is an easy way for people to give back and help conserve our natural environment for future generations.

After a record 113,502 people took part last year, wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation believes this summer's UK-wide event could be even bigger.

Fine spring weather has seen the earliest average emergence of butterflies for 20 years, sparking thousands of extra enquiries from a curious public about their butterfly and moth sightings.

The Big Butterfly Count asks people to spend 15 minutes in an outdoor space in sunny weather counting the amount and type of butterflies (and two day-flying moths) they see. They then submit their



findings to complete being part of the UK's largest citizen science project.

Last year 1,595,579 butterflies were counted – an average of 16.25 per 15-minute count. The Painted Lady was sighted 420,841 times, followed by the the Peacock (207,814) and Small White (179,715). Others sighted over 100,000 times were the Gatekeeper (161,987), Large White (139,671) and Meadow Brown (110,858).

Each year the data is used to map and measure populations and the geographic spread of species across the UK. It is a key indicator of the health of our environment, including the effects of climate change.

The annual event, the world's biggest survey of butterflies, runs until Sunday August 9th. Anyone can sign up by downloading the app or species charts for England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland from **Bigbutterflycount.org**





Protect yourself against scams

Members of IWASP (Isle of Wight Against Scams Partnership) have been working together for over three years to raise awareness around

scams and doorstep crime and protect Island residents from becoming victims.

Scammers are incredibly sophisticated criminals who have access to all types of technology which helps to convince us that they are genuine. They are able to clone telephone numbers so that you think you are being contacted by your bank, they will clone Facebook pages to convince you your friend is in trouble and in need of money, and can access laptops showing bank accounts, which they have the skills to doctor to fit their narrative. All of which seems entirely genuine to us.

How do we know if it's a scam?

•An unexpected email or telephone call. Scammers will claim to be from a variety of organisations including Amazon, the Police, HMRC, your bank – Remember no legitimate organisation will contact you in this way.

•You will be put under pressure to respond either by threats "a warrant out for your arrest" or entitcements "you have been charged for Amazon Prime – press 1 for a refund".

• Be wary of anyone knocking your door offering to carry out jobs for you – even if they need doing. Anyone behaving like this is liable to be a rogue trader who will over-charge you, take your money and do a poor job.

There's not a lot that can be done to stop the calls, emails and messages coming in but there are things we can do to protect ourselves.

'Out & About' Cards created for vulnerable Islanders

Age Friendly Island and its partners have created a set of 'Out & About' Cards to help people to feel more confident to navigate social distancing and other Covid-secure measures that are now in place.

With the lockdown restrictions easing, Emma Lincoln, Age UKIW's Age Friendly Island project manager said that some people were finding the new situations challenging: "In our high streets, shops, cafes, pubs and hairdressers and on the buses and ferries we are all navigating the new measures that the government has brought in as a response to coronavirus.

We are social distancing, wearing face coverings, being served from behind a clear screen, and using contactless payments. For some people these measures bring additional difficulties due to a medical condition or disability. For others the idea of returning to places that have changed can be daunting."

are designed to be used to let people know that the cardholder finds these new situations challenging.

Progress wth ocean hotel site

I have been in discussion with the agent for the receivers of the Ocean Hotel. The Ocean Hotel is just one of 22 properties that belonged to the Carlauren Group; of which three are on the Island. The receivers are dealing with these three first because of their cross Solent location. 70 people have bought apartments proposed for the Ocean, each has a lease and therefore have a vested interest. Clearly, those buyers will not recover their investment, but negotiations with them is showing some promise and if agreement is reached with them, the Ocean could be up for sale within a matter of months.

Sandown bay – beach management working party established

During the lockdown people understandably made use of our beaches, but there were fears and complaints about lack of separation between bathers, jets skis and other issues. My efforts to establish who was responsible to supervise such matters concluded that local Bye Laws and old rules had become obsolete. Also, it is impractical for the Portsmouth based Maritime Police to cover the whole Island.

This situation affects all the beaches on the Island, so I raised the issue with the IW Council Cabinet, and we decided to try and establish a beach supervision regime that was fit for purpose. The White-Tailed Eagle – also known as a Sea Eagle – was wiped out throughout the UK, with the last pair breeding on Culver Cliff in 1780. But now a groundbreaking project from Forestry England and the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation plans to reestablish them in their ancestral home over the course of five years. Six were released last year, of which one or two are still regularly spotted still here on the Island.

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News from Shanklin South & Central

Shanklin - Social Distancing

Following discussions initiated by ourselves, including Shanklin Town Councillors and the IW Council, a decision has been made that the programme is now complete in respect of short term measures. These measures promote social distancing in towns which have an active retail frontage of shops. The measures involved the installation of signs and pavement graphics to raise awareness with the aim of facilitating social distancing in areas where that is difficult. The locations have been determined to meet the government guidance on such interventions as part of an overall package to support high street businesses reopening. Signs and pavement graphics to raise awareness and promote social distancing have now been installed in Regent Street and Shanklin High Street. These measures will be maintained until early September, after which further extension of the scheme will be reviewed.

Road Upgrades and Improvements

Island Roads

have resumed their carriageway and footway improvement programme following a suspension of work due to the Covid-19 outbreak. As part of this, night-time work will once again

be undertaken where it will help reduce disruption. Although the most intensive period of resurfacing work is over, Island Roads is planning a further four years of significant activity to ensure it is well placed to meet the requirements over the remaining 18 years of the Highways PFI contract. With over 90% of the main roads now improved, much of this year's work will focus on lesser used residential roads and streets.

Bay Action Group

After initial action by ourselves, a Bay Beach Group has been formed with Bay councillors and the cabinet member responsible for public safety. The group is currently in negotiation with IW Council to take measures to provide supervision of the beaches in the Bay area including the installation of effective safety buoys. The need for this has been brought to light lately by reports of badly piloted jet skis, anti-social behaviour including excessive consumption of alcohol and littering etc. These actions will fit with the recently achieved Solent Water Quality Awards and the Southern Water Bathing Water Enhancement Programme.

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Where there's a Will there's a way

When the lockdown was announced earlier this year, Solicitors all across the country were hard at work, writing Wills for people who, fearing the worst, wanted to make sure their affairs were in order should they fall ill.

Thankfully after a difficult few months, with the virus now in retreat, people are gradually starting to get back to normal. However it remains vitally important that people still consider the need to make a Will to ensure their loved ones, or chosen charities benefit in the manner they would like them to.

If someone does not make a Will then they are known as 'intestate' and the intestacy laws laid down by government will apply to their estate on their death.

It may well be that the intestacy laws mean that their estate will be inherited by their chosen relatives. However, there are many instances when this would not be the case. It is terribly sad to see families fall out when it would have been the very last thing their relative would have wanted, but unfortunately this happens more often than you would think.

The law is somewhat rigid and it can not take into account everyone's personal circumstances. Therefore if you do not make a Will and you have very few living relatives it could be that your distant cousins stand to inherit on your death, you may not have met them, or you might not like them! Your preference may be to leave money to charity, in which case you would need to make a Will to ensure this happens.

One common misconception is that unmarried partners, which are sometimes referred to as 'common-law partners', will inherit from the estate of their partner. This is not the case and they will not inherit anything at all, aside from any assets they held jointly with their partner. This can lead to some truly unjust outcomes, as can be seen with the example of Mr Brown and Mrs Smith below:

Mr Brown and Mrs Smith are in their 80s and have been in a relationship together for 40 years. They have always considered that they live together 'as man and wife', although they have never actually married. They live in a property owned solely by Mr Brown with a value of £200,000. Mr Brown and Mrs Smith run a joint account for household expenditure, but never let the balance get too high. Mr Brown has two sons from his previous relationship.

Mr Brown passed away suddenly before he

made his Will, it was always on his 'to-do' list but he always let other tasks leap frog over it. If you had asked him before he died he would have said he wanted Mrs Smith to live in his house after his death, so that she could live out the rest of her days in comfort. He only wanted his sons to inherit after Mrs Smith had passed away. However, because Mr Brown did not make a Will his two sons inherit everything now, apart from the joint account.

If Mrs Smith can not reach an agreement with Mr Brown's two boys she will have to start legal proceedings if she wants to receive anything from Mr Brown's estate, which in her 80s Mrs Smith will find quite stressful.

If Mr Brown had made a Will then he and Mrs Smith would have had the peace of mind that Mrs Smith would be well provided for on his death.

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Coming in every shade from darkest inky purple to purest white, no summer garden is complete without the extraordinary blooms of agapanthus, writes Flo Whitaker

gapanthus are native to South Africa but they've spread themselves all over that continent and much of the world besides. They've picked up many different names in their travels, including African Lily, Queen Lily and Nile Lily. This is a classic example of how confusing things can be when you stray off the botanical classification path. Agapanthus doesn't naturally occur by the Nile, nor is it a lily; it's a member of the amaryllis family.

A warm, well-lit spot is what agapanthus craves. They'll enjoy a sunny border location in gravelly soil. However, their long, succulent leaves can easily dominate the scene and smother surrounding plants (to be honest, the leaves alone are not terribly interesting to look at), so they are best grown in containers



where they will enjoy freedraining conditions and their foliage is less likely to encroach onto neighbours. Another advantage of growing agapanthus in pots is that they can be moved into prominent positions as they come into flower, then relegated to the sidelines as the blooms fade. These drought-tolerant characters will also relish the heat rising up from sun-baked patio paving.

The belief that

agapanthus prefers an overcrowded root system and a starvation diet is wrong. Just because they'll survive on neglect doesn't mean you shouldn't give them decent conditions to thrive. Soil type is critical; it sounds perverse but it should be damp, but also free-draining. A mixture of 70% peat-free potting soil combined with a scoop of moisture-retaining leaf mould and 30%

horticultural grit is ideal – the grit will prevent water pooling around the fleshy roots which are prone to rot. A springtime feed of multipurpose fertiliser will give them a boost, but don't overfeed as that will create

Agapanthus need repotting every few years, preferably in spring. It's a brutal process, as they make impenetrable spaghettilike roots that cannot be teased apart. Employ a sharp kitchen knife (and a steady nerve) and slice through the rootball from top to bottom, cutting it into chunks. Ensure each piece has a healthy growing shoot attached and discard any material that looks old and tired. Repot into fresh compost, leaving soil spaces between each segment for new roots to grow into.

In southern England, most agapanthus varieties will be hardy. Herbaceous types (they lose the majority of their leaves and semihibernate during winter) are tough characters and will survive all weathers, including salt-laden gales, which is why they are such favourites in coastal areas. Tender varieties retain their leaves and can be damaged by frost, so are best overwintered in a cool greenhouse. Whatever you choose to call them, the stunning architectural blooms of agapanthus will grace any garden. 3
