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

Sheridan, who instantly fell in love with the Island, was the perfect host and went out of her way to be helpful. There was no time limit on the interview and she was delightful company. I was invited to stay on and we had a walk around the garden.

Just before our interview I asked Sheridan to solve a puzzle. The day before, I had seen her in a daily paper with red hair. Now here she was next to me as a blonde. The answer was simple. She'd been in Australia filming Mrs Biggs, who had red hair, and she had gone blonde again just the day before.

My immediate impression was that Sheridan was so grateful for the chances she had early in her career. Like our own Laura Michelle Kelly, she never went to a posh drama school. In fact, they did work together as young teenagers. Sheridan joined the National Youth Musical Theatre and was spotted at the age of 17 in their London production of Bugsy Malone. That led directly to Into The Woods at the Donmar Warehouse.

"After being in a large cast of children I was suddenly in a show with Dilys Laye, Sophie Thompson, Anne Reid and Jenni Russell. It was quite a shock coming from a little village but they really took me under their wing and I learnt so much," said Sheridan.

She admitted to being a workaholic and told me I was just the same - and she

Rocking the Isle of Wight

The remarkable story of three twenty-somethings from Totland

Almost overnight

who rose to every

entrepreneurs

challenge that

came their way

they became daring

New book *Rocking The Isle of Wight* by Alan and Tom Stroud focuses on the original Isle of Wight festivals that were put on by three Totland brothers, Ronnie, Ray and Bill Foulk.

he book tells the story of the festivals which brought global superstars and hundreds of thousands of music fans to Godshill, Wootton and Freshwater between 1968 and 1970 but from the so far untold local angle. It is a fascinating day by day account of how locals from all walks of life helped the brothers to put on the festivals — and also how many others did not!

It tells how local landowners and a council full of brigadiers, admirals, commanders and generals, all strictly opposed to the festivals, were aided and abetted by the local MP and newspapers, who were firmly against the festivals.

In those far off days of the sixties, an outdoor gathering attracting hundreds of thousands was literally unheard of in this country. Pulling off such an event would have been a daunting undertaking for anybody, but three twenty-somethings from Totland, armed with little more than the confidence of

youth managed to carry it off. Almost overnight they became daring entrepreneurs who rose to every challenge that came their way. Along the way they sometimes got things wrong but mostly, they got it right.

Over 272 pages long, Rocking The Isle of Wight contains confidential official documents, interviews with

locals, unseen correspondence, and over 60 superb quality colour photographs including previously unseen ones of the 1970 festival taken by Ken Box,

who taught art at Carisbrooke Grammar at the time.

It is a remarkable story, involving a superstar cast, death threats, High Court battles, an Act of Parliament and huge amounts of money, and the fact that it all happened here on the Island makes the story even more remarkable.

Their first festival in 1968 was a small scale affair at

Godshill, attracting between seven and 10,000 fans, and encouraged by making a small profit, the brothers decided to hold a bigger and better event in 1969. Against all the odds the Foulk brothers persuaded Bob Dylan to perform in a field at Wootton and become part of the largest outdoor assembly ever seen in this country and literally invented the British rock festival. The event was a success and with their stars in the ascendant they announced a festival the following year. At that point they seemed invincible and it seemed the

> Isle of Wight Festival was here to stay. But it was not to be.

They were stopped dead in their tracks in 1970 just as their careers were about to take off.
Their

downfall was being forced by the council to use the Afton site. Between 250 and 300,000 fans attended but many used the downs overlooking the arena to watch the performances for free rather than buy a ticket. Musically a huge success, it was a financial disaster and the brothers lost everything.

Rocking The Isle of Wight has a commentary throughout the

book by Ray Foulk, who says: "The book contains refreshing revelations after half a century of exaggerations, confusions and downright untruths. The Strouds are more than qualified to undertake this comprehensive examination of the original Isle of Wight Festivals."


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INGREDIENTS

450g (16oz) haggis with packaging (not casing) removed 600g (21oz) swede peeled and cut into rough 1.5cm chunks 600g (21oz) floury potatoes such as King Edwards peeled and cut into 2cm chunks 30g (loz) butter 5 tbsp sunflower oil 50g (2oz) plain flour 200g (7oz) bag prepared kale or 225g whole leaves 4-6 duck eggs poached (see instructions below)

METHOD

Steam the haggis in advance, prick the casing in about 6 places with a thin skewer and put into a steamer and when the water boils lower the heat and simmer gently for 40 minutes. Take out of the steamer and put to one side.

Meanwhile, put the peeled and chopped swede and potato in separate pans of fast boiling salted water and lower heat to a simmer until soft. Drain once they are ready and leave in the colander with kitchen paper over until both are cooked. Tip both into a bowl, add the butter and mash until smooth.

Preheat the oven to 180C/360F/Gas 4. Meanwhile take the casing off the haggis and crumble into a bowl. Add 150g (5oz) of the haggis into the potato and mix through.

A Roughly strip the kale off any tough stems. Measure out 20g (loz) of the leaves and put to one side. Spread the remaining leaves in a single layer on a large baking sheet toss with half a teaspoon of the oil and bake for 5 minutes until crispy but not brown. Put on a tray to cool.

5 Wilt the 20g of kale leaves you put to one side in boiling salted water for 5 minutes. Refresh under cold running water, drain well and squeeze out all the moisture and pat dry with

Poaching the Eggs

When poaching eggs for a crowd cook one at a time in water that starts off simmering, add a splash of vinegar and salt and swirl the water to create a whirlpool effect and then crack the egg into the centre. Turn down the heat and poach for 2-2 1/2 minutes. Lift into cold water with a slotted spoon. When ready to eat pop them all into a large pot of fresh hot water for about 45 seconds to heat through.

> just crisping up and serve scattered over the cakes along with the crispy kale.

You could make the cakes in advance, wrap in tin foil and heat in a moderate oven.

And what about the stress? A brisk daily walk in fresh air will reduce your adrenalin load. Yoga, tai chi and meditation may not be your thing, but finding your own way to relax is essential. And a large daily helping of green fruit and vegetables will do wonders to boost your immunity.

Golden Milk

(to boost your immunity)

In a small saucepan, simmer half to 1 tsp of turmeric powder in approximately 120ml (4fl oz) of water for 5 minutes, then add about 200ml (7fl oz) of milk (or almond milk), a pinch of black pepper and 1-2 tsp of sweet almond (or coconut) oil.

Bring just to the boil and remove from heat, add honey to taste and drink hot. Research has shown that the cucurmin in turmeric will also boost the 'good' cholesterol in the body, and it has anti-inflammatory properties and improves joint health.


Start at the National Trust Tennyson Down car park, postcode PO39 0HY. As you come into the car park, take the path on the left, up the steep steps towards the Tennyson Monument. The steps veer to the right.

When you get to the Tennyson Monument, head right and keep to the left and stroll along the top of the cliff. But beware of cliff edges. You'll pass through a couple of gates, before heading back down off the cliffs towards the Coastguard Station. Turn right, towards the Needles Old Battery and Alum Bay.

Head through the West High Down gate, followed by a further gate and down some steps on to the road. Keep heading right.

When you get to the bend, take the steps on your right to Tennyson Down.

Walk through the field following the overhead power line. You'll pass Warren Farm on your left.

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


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

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DONKEY

JOURNEY'S END IS NEAR

t's been a tough year for all Island charities, with vital fundraising events being cancelled left, right and centre — and the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary has found it particularly tough.

But the team of staff and volunteers say what shines through the most is the dedication their supporters have shown in these troubled times.

Having to close to the public for four months during the first lockdown, followed by a further month shortly before Christmas, the sanctuary had been unable to welcome guests on to the farm, into the shop and cafe, through which they raise much needed funding.

As well as many popular events throughout the year, including Gaelic Day, Donkey Valentines, Concert in the Courtyard and Fun Dog Shows, the sanctuary usually raises funds through festive events such as Santa in a Stable, nativities, Christmas markets and their popular Christmas Carol Service. Sadly none of these have been able to go ahead in 2020 due to Covid-19 lockdowns

and restrictions, but the supporters of the sanctuary have stepped up, with their own fundraising efforts. One incredible supporter over the festive season was Luke from Binstead, who lit up his house for Christmas and put a charity donation box in place to raise money for the donkeys. Fab Fundraisers Packs are available from the sanctuary for people who are planning to organise sponsored events for the sanctuary in 2021.

Staff and volunteers at The Donkey Sanctuary have been working hard to continue to offer the same great level of care for their much loved donkeys — and to give opportunities to adopters to visit their adopted donkeys during the festive period.

Another truly heartwarming story to come out of this tumultuous year, is that of ten French donkeys, which became the sanctuary's first international rescue.

"Recently we were contacted by a British lady in France, Tracey Bradford, who had helped to rescue two families of donkeys from a slaughterhouse, where they had been destined for the Italian meat market," the sanctuary announced on Facebook in October.

"The donkeys had all been through a terrible time and needed a permanent home. The question was, could the Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary complete this rescue and give these beautiful donkeys a permanent home?"

"We looked at our land, we looked at



our stables and barns and we looked at our new woodchip barn. We thought about our staff and our volunteers. We all came to the same conclusion. We must help these donkeys.

"Operation 'Bring the French Donkeys to Wroxall' is being prepared! Passports, vet checks, transport, ferries, stabling all are being planned. The challenges are great – an English Lockdown, a French Lockdown and the need to beat Brexit by

December 31st. If we achieve this it will be a wonderful Christmas for the donkeys and for the sanctuary."

At the time of going to press, Tracey had made all of the necessary passport applications, got the microchips sorted, arranged vet checks and was currently waiting for the authorities to return the completed information so they could travel across .

Donkeys Hope, Charity, Javette, Jiva, Jenny, Jumpy, Josephine and Junon and babies Koko and Kitchy are hopefully on their way in time for the new year.

Thankfully, exciting renovations which were planned for this year did go ahead, despite a number of set backs. And now the sanctuary is able to welcome guests into its beautiful newly built Grazers Cafe. Grazers is open for hot and cold food, cream teas and tasty seasonal treats.



The sanctuary was also thrilled to win Red Funnel's Isle of Wight Gold Award 2020 for the best place for families to bring their dogs. An award which reflects the beautiful countryside walks surrounding

the sanctuary and the warm welcome received by all visitors.

The sanctuary will be open this year on New Years Day so people can burn off the previous night's excesses by walking around the sanctuary, meeting the donkeys and having fresh coffee and cake

in Grazers café. The sanctuary's Browse and Brays gift shop will also be open, with a lovely selection of gifts and cards for sale. The donkeys will be mostly found in the barn, unless we get some bright frosty days. The barns will be open for people to walk round.

Moving forward in to 2021, the team at Isle of Wight Donkey Sanctuary are hoping for a less challenging year.

"We have been hard hit by the impact of Covid-19, but we continue to be grateful for the help from our supporters in making donations, buying items from our Amazon wishlist, and adopting donkeys. Without your help, it would have been extremely difficult to deal with the challenges of 2020. There may be further, difficult challenges ahead, but we are determined to remain positive and give our donkeys the best winter care possible." ③





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Spotlight on local organisations supported by RTC community grants - Wight Wave Beach Sports

In 2007 England Beach Soccer departed the Island. On leaving the Island it left behind around 150 senior mens team players and eight established mens teams, que Luke Kerr who as one of those players and coaches created Isle of Wight Beach Soccer Association (IWBSS) representing the teams and working alongside Hampshire FA to ensure the league could continue. Fast forward 13 years later and we have seen the development of the sport, its teams and opportunities for both boys and girls grow well beyond the 12 boys Luke Kerr started with his first ever youth coaching camp in the summer of 2008.

Today Isle of Wight Beach Soccer has over 800 members, represent youth teams from age six to 16 with leagues and cups, has taken both u16 and u18 teams to the World Youth Cup along continuing to support the growth of both mens events and the rapidly growing womens game making the Isle of Wight still the centre of growth and excellence for beach soccer in England.

In 2019 with more sports than ever we saw over 1,200 participants taking part in beach sports from all over the Island and from the mainland of all ages both boys and girls, men and women and despite Covid hitting in 2020 the team at Wight Wave were still able to deliver social distanced community beach sports via coaching and with a reduced capacity set of events engaging with youth players and tackle issues such as social deprivation, inclusion, health, obesity and mental health with providing low cost vibrant, safe and engaging events.

Luke Kerr explained more: "Today beach sports are accessible







to all the community across our natural beach resources on the Island, you don't need fancy footwear or expensive equipment, with all our events you can turn up bare footed and just play and by the end of the day playing beach sports you are not only challenged by the sand with your fitness but the wide open spaces and being by the sea this offers huge escapism and helps put people's minds at rest and escape those every day challenges we all face in life. Beach sports can play an important role in the community with health, the economy and its very unique to the Island with our beaches we have along our coastline and more importantly in Ryde'.

News from Sandown South

Let's look forward to 2021!

After an unbelievable 2020 which has delayed regeneration work in Sandown because of Covid, manpower shortages and financial difficulties. Hopefully 2021 will see projects restarting and getting back on track. Sandown has so much potential if we look forward rather than backwards.

Towns all around the country are suffering from changes in people's shopping habits and seaside towns have to deal with this on top of the changes in tourism. I believe that Sandown will overcome these difficulties, but it will take time. So, let's be positive and promote Sandown.

Update on progress with derilict buildings

I keep myself updated on all the sites within Sandown South. I am in contact with the property owners, council planning and enforcement officers and do arrange meetings between property owners and council officers to address problems. It is often extremely frustrating when I encounter a mountain of difficulties that delay progress.

Property owners have very strong rights and people's misconception that the council can simply force owners into taking action; unfortunately, it is just not that simple.

On the positive side I can say that all the Sandown South sites are being actively managed and progressing, even the Ocean Hotel! Tackling vandalism

I have been in discussion with the Head of Community Safety about the increase of vandalism in Sandown during the summer months, in particular the frequent damage to our public toilets which have had to shut until repairs are done; and the play park in Sandham Gardens where complete play equipment has had to be taken out of use. Graffiti is also on the increase. Other IW Councillors confirmed that this is an Islandwide problem as they had also seen such increases. After my subsequent discussions with the Head of Community Safety he agreed to undertake an action plan with the co-operation of the

Sandown will be turning purple in spring



A Purple4Purple campaign will raise funds and awareness for End Polio Now, a global programme to eradicate polio across the world.

In support of the campaign, Sandown Rotary generously gave Sandown Green Town Volunteers 3,000 purple crocus corms for planting across Sandown in autumn 2020.

Christine Jackson, Chair of Sandown Green Town Volunteers said: "We saw this as a great opportunity

to liaise with other groups across Sandown. Everyone we approached was delighted to join in. So crocuses were planted in the Willow Walk, thanks to the Common Space, in the Isle of Wight Zoo and at Battery Gardens, thanks to the Friends of Battery Gardens."

Polio is a viral infection that used to be common in the UK and worldwide. Cases of polio in the UK fell dramatically following mass-vaccination programmes in the late '50s. There has not been a case in the UK since the mid-80s.

Rotary first pledged to work for a polio free world in 1985 when there were 125 polio endemic countries and hundreds of new cases every day. In the past few years only two countries have reported cases of polio caused by the wild poliovirus, thanks to over 2 billion doses of oral polio vaccine still being administered to more than 400 million children in over 50 countries each year.

Belgrave Road repairs to start in summer

Planned investigations are hoped to confirm the cause of Ventnor's Belgrave Road collapse, finally enabling remedial works to begin.

Last January, part of the retaining wall failed and wire netting had to be installed to help contain falling debris.

The results of the upcoming survey will allow engineers to safely repair and secure the wall. It is hoped works will be completed by October 2021.

Councillor Ian Ward, said: "It is important the next steps are based on sound evidence and the forthcoming survey work should give us

the information needed to implement the best possible

"We would like to thank residents for their ongoing cooperation and understanding and we will ensure both they and the wider local community are kept updated with developments."

Happy New Year. I hope you enjoyed a nice Wight Christmas. My doors were flung wide open at midnight on New Year's Eve to let 2020 out, here's hoping that things get back

We have much to be thankful for and look forward to in 2021 and beyond, for instance residents will have the opportunity to take part in public consultations on how they would like to see our High Street and Western Esplanade revamped as funding is available for the Esplanade works and part funding (hoping to get more) for the High Street where RTC & IOW are working in partnership with Historic England, on a public realm improvement schame. realm improvement scheme.

There is also funding available to help retail properties repurpose the upper and rear of their properties into residential accommodation along with funding to restore the

shop fronts to their original glory.

Island Line should be closed down for engineering upgrade improvements that are to take three months starting not long before this report is published, the improvements that include five new trains are to improve connectivity, quality of journey and ridership, there is also to be Wifi available during journeys.

We are also supposed get a new pedestrian walkway on the old tram track down the pier, I do hope Wightlink add funding to provide a covered walkway.

Ryde Town Council (RTC) will be leasing Ryde Theatre with a view to purchase, subject to winning a successful funding bid to bring our theatre back into community use. RTC now own the long time suffering Vectis Hall and will be seeking a way forward to perture our historic building.

to restore our historic building.

Ryde Harbour's freehold should be passed to RTC this year for £1 paid to IW Council, giving the opportunity for local management and upgrade of the facility and associated areas future use and RTC are still in the process of acquiring and repurposing St Thomas Church. These projects will be opportunities for our HAZ officer and RTC officers bidding for future available funding streams like the levelling up fund.

Swans have been found dead on Canoe Lake in November and December. The

last time this happened, I was worried it was bird flue so had one sent to DEFRA for examination, the results proved they had died from over feeding with seed, as if they eat too much it swells in their stomachs and kills them. I also now note a flare up of bird flu in our southern region, so if you find any dead wild birds such as swans, geese or ducks you should report them the DEFRA helpline on **03459 33 55 77**.

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Ventnor Park

In a major step forward for the future management of the town's remarkable park a draft lease has been offered to the Town Council on a 30-year term at a current annual contract cost of £31,000 with the IW Council contributing £3,400 for its statutory responsibility for litter collection and bin emptying, leaving the town with a £27,600 cost. Three years ago the Town Council was told that the IW Council could no longer afford to maintain the Park at its current standard and was planning to provide only litter picking and bin emptying.



New Public Toilet

The Town Council's plans to build a new public toilet in the Central Car Park were advanced by the decision of December's Town Council meeting to apply to the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government for permission to borrow £150,000 from the Public Works Loan Board. A tender process for the work was completed in December and it is hoped this important new facility will be completed in time for this vear's season.

Outdoor Gym

Following the Island's entry into Tier 1 our outdoor gym in Ventnor Park was able to have a much welcomed re-opening. After this year's annual maintenance inspection it was decided that the piece of equipment known as the Elliptical X Trainer had reached the stage at which it needed

replacement. The Town Council agreed to fund that replacement with an Arm & Pedal machine at a cost of £1,165 and the change-over was completed on the last day of November.

Filming In Salisbury Gardens

The filming of Britbox's five-part thriller The Beast Must Die took over our Green Room and other parts of our building for over a week at the end of October as TBMD Productions transformed them into film sets. They also needed to close Dudley Road and its car park for part of that time and provided local residents with letters and a visit to resolve any major issues caused by their work.

Partnership Working

At the invitation of Ryde Town Council, the Mayor and Clerk met virtually with Ryde's Mayor, Town Clerk and two of their Councillors to discuss collaborative working across the range of our shared agendas. The discussion included Community Development, Youth Work, the Public Realm, Flections, Harbours and relationships with the IW Council.

South Wight Parishes

The latest meeting of the South Wight Parishes Health and Wellbeing Forum organised by our Community Development Officer was held virtually on 3 December. The two invited speakers at it were Dr. Ooommen John from the Ventnor Medical Centre & Primary Care Network and Dr. Mark Rawlinson, Locality Manager.

While returning to Southampton, she ran ashore in a heavy gale on the Ring Rocks, off Foreland Ledge. The story of the rescue by the lifeboat Queen Victoria with Coxswain John Holbrook in command and local older fishermen, coastguards and local volunteers rescuing all of the crew including the ship's dog and cat is amazing.

Windmills Pre-School were awarded £510 towards new play equipment in their garden.


Friends of Holy Trinity Church were awarded £380 towards building upgrades on The Cloisters



End of Life Decisions

As we step forward into a brighter 2021 and a take a leap away from the shadow cast by 2020 it is important that we take stock of last year. It was a year like we had never known before where we all had to confront the reality that life can be cut short and not to take the simple things for granted. As we walk forward with a renewed optimism for the future it is important not to lose sight of the need to discuss important issues such as our wishes for end of life care with loved ones.

The coming year will rightly bring with it an ongoing review of how many matters were handled and managed during the pandemic, so that lessons can be learnt for the future. We of course already know that vulnerable people have been the hardest hit by the pandemic, having to shield to protect themselves for months, away from family and friends. It is also very concerning to hear that Do-Not-Attempt-Resuscitate (DNAR) orders, that being a document which tells your medical team not to attempt cardiopulmonary

resuscitation (CPR), have been wrongly applied for vulnerable people.

Sadly the Care Quality Commission's review into the application of DNAR orders during the pandemic has shown that they have been incorrectly used as they have been applied to groups of people, particularly care home residents. This isn't how they should be used and this kind of treatment of older people cannot be tolerated going forwards.

There are best practice guidelines set out by the Resuscitation Council, but unfortunately they aren't being followed everywhere. Too often these are ignored or treated as a tick box exercise with people often accepting a DNAR to avoid feeling like a burden. Consultation on DNAR orders should prompt meaningful consultation with patients and loved ones and consider their wishes and their general health, not focus purely on age. All of us should talk to our loved ones about whether we would want to be resuscitated and our other wishes for care should we have an accident or serious

illness. Once we are in an emergency situation it can be too late. There are many legal tools at our disposal to guarantee that our wishes are carried out by our loved ones, including Advance Directives (Living Wills) and Lasting Powers of Attorney for Health and Welfare.

Interestingly research shows that only 59% of those aged 70+ have talked to loved ones about their care wishes. And whilst 81% of us think planning ahead for later life is important, only 22% of us have a Lasting Power of Attorney in place, setting out our wishes in writing in a legally binding way.

So whilst it is good to live in the present, we can only truly do that with the peace of mind that whatever the future may hold, we have the right support in place. We really do need to start talking about our wishes should we lose mental and/or physical capacity or require emergency medical treatment. This recent investigation into the use of DNARs must encourage us all to have those difficult, but vital conversations, no matter our age.

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Hanging out WITH HOLLY

There's a lot more to holly than spiky green leaves and a few red berries. Peter Erridge explains all things historical and prickly.

ossils indicate ancestors of holly existed around 50 million years ago. The Druids considered holly to be a sacred plant with a strong place in their belief system; as a symbol of fertility, eternal life, and protection against lightning strikes.

Holly is found in hedgerows, usually grown from seeds dropped by birds; and is left as markers of footpaths, old boundaries or sightlines for ploughmen. A group of hollies is called a 'hollin' and appears in place names such as Hollingbourne in Kent.

The name holly comes from an old English word meaning prickly and has nothing to do with 'holy'. Christians associate holly with their religion; the spines on the leaves representing the crown of thorns and the berries the drops of blood shed at the crucifixion.

According to Churchwardens' records, holly and ivy were used to decorate churches from the 15th century. The association was strengthened in the early 19th century when German members of George III's household brought Christmas trees indoors. In 1841 the press reported Queen Victoria had a Christmas tree and

brightened the scene with glossy leaved, red berried holly. Thus, a tradition was born, although it was initially seldom seen outside wealthier families.

The holly genus is widespread in temperate Hedgehog and sub-tropical regions of the world, but large holly woods thrive mainly in Britain. There are over 450 species of holly, including trees, shrubs and climbers. They occur in temperate and tropical climates and grow in most



soils except wet and poorly drained, preferring acid soils. Hollies are hardy and adapted to the shade of woodlands, creating an understory.

Being rich in nutrients holly is often grazed by animals and until the early 18th century farmers used it as a feed. Above grazing height leaves tend to be smooth. The larger shrubs and trees with dense foliage provide shelter from harsh weather for cattle and birds. Few diseases or pests affect hollies although the caterpillars of Holly Blue butterflies feed on the leaves.

Folklore relates a heavy crop of berries to a forthcoming hard winter, when in fact the density

of berries depends on the number of pollinating insects at flowering time.

Readers should know of Ilex aquifolium, the English holly, with dark green spiny leaves. However, there are many cultivars some with a variable number of spines, or no spines, and some with yellow or silver leaf colouring. Most hollies are either male or female with only the latter bearing berries. A word of caution - some varieties have misleading names such as Golden Queen, which is actually a male holly!

Although most berries are red, they can also be yellow, white, or black. They contain poisonous

substances affecting people and animals. With children, eating

as few as two berries can lead to stomach upsets. For birds, they're more palatable after being frosted when the berries soften and have a milder taste. Germination of holly seeds can be slow taking from 6 to 16 months.

Things have gone full circle since the Druids and these days it's considered unlucky to bring holly indoors before Christmas Eve, but good luck should ensue if this holly is burnt in the garden after Christmas. ³







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
