

CHRISTMAS CAKE KITS

AVAILABLE FROM HER WHEY

INGREDIENTS

Bag 1: 250g soft dark brown sugar, 2 tsp mixed spice, 1 tsp ground cinnamon Bag 2: 175g organic plain flour, ½ tsp

bicarbonate of soda, pinch of organic salt

Bag 3: 100g ground almonds Bag 4: 100g mixed nuts Bag 5: 500g mixed fruit (includes raisins, currants, sultanas, mixed peel) Bag 6: 200g close cherrise (cher co

Bag 6: 200g glace cherries (chop as desired), 1 orange to use as extra zest or fresh orange juice To add

200ml orange juice, 150ml brandy, rum or tea plus extra for feeding, 4 eggs, 2 tsp vanilla extract, 200g unsalted butter

METHOD

Put the dried fruit, orange juice & brandy (or alternative) into a container, stir and leave overnight.

Heat the oven to 300F/150C/140C fan/ gas mark 2.

3 Line a deep 20cm cake tin with a double layer of parchment paper, making sure it comes at least 3cm above the edge of the tin. Then wrap a double layer of newspaper or brown paper around the outside, tying it with string (this helps stop the fruit burning) Add a circle of foil on top of the mixture but poke holes in it to allow the steam to rise.

4 Cream the butter, sugar & vanilla extract together in a large bowl. Add the eggs in one at a time and stir until well combined.





5 Add the flour, baking powder, mixed spice, 5 Cinnamon, fruit & nuts and stir well until combined.

6 Bake for 1.5 hours then turn the oven down to 280F/140C/130C fan/Gas mark 1, bake for a further 2.5/3 hours. Your cake is cooked when a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean.

Cool the cake in the cake tin, then remove, wrap in baking parchment & store in an airtight container, it will keep for 6 months.

Breed your cake every week by skewering it in several places & sprinkling with 1tsp of your choice of alcohol, tea or orange

juice and rewrap between feedings. Add marzipan, icing & decorations a week before you

decorations a week before you wish to serve it, to give it time to dry. Enjoy!

Catching up with CRAIG DAVID

Craig David is back after a well-earned break with a new single. Isle of Wight Radio presenter, David Frances, caught up with him over Zoom — about the last few years.

DAVID: How did you cope thoughout the lockdowns? **CRAIG:** You know, lockdown was affecting all of us in in a myriad of different ways. But I was just grateful that my friends and my family were okay. And wherever I could try to help people in the community just like neighbours to make sure they're okay. But after that, it became sort of a creative process, I was like, well, okay, let me write songs. Let me write songs. Let me write songs. And the next thing you know, I had so many songs by the time we could go back out and actually meet people again. I was like, wow, we're in a really interesting position. **DAVID:** It seemed to be a very cathartic time for the

record industry, loads of people spent their lockdown writing new albums.

CRAIG: I think it gave everyone the opportunity to do things that they wouldn't normally do, because they never had the time to do it. And that's not to say that all the issues and problems that were going on, I mean, putting food on the table and paying the rent, and those things were still happening, but it was like, okay, I can't do anything. We're going to pull the Monopoly board out tonight, and we're going to have a game, or we're going to watch a movie that I've never watched because I've never got time.

DAVID: Where in the world are you living now?

CRAIG: I'm in the UK. I tried to make my studio setup feel like if we're in the Maldives or Miami or somewhere. That's the greatness of a printer. And some nice glossy paper and a little bit of imagination that you can definitely give it a vibe. Do you know what, it actually goes hand in hand with how it was when I was living in Southampton. And I was at City College and I'd use the printer cartridges and the paper there when everyone thought when I was in the library, they're like, great, you're in the library all the time. We're studying how to get this cover of a mixtape right and print it out correctly. **DAVID:** Let's talk about the new record then. Your email must be full of people sending you requests and demos and ideas and stuff. So how

did this track with MNEK happen? **CRAIG:** Me and MNEK share the same circle of friends and songwriters. So we've always had this link, but we've never actually said, okay, should we do a record together? And he sung the vocal that we hear now on 'Who You Are'. And when I heard that, I was like, whoa, something special just happened right here. And he couldn't really see because he's in the eye of the storm. I said I need you to be on this record. I was so thankful that he accepted and said that he'd stay on the record, because it wouldn't have come out, put it that way, because there wasn't a vocalist I could feel that would have portrayed it like he does.

DAVID: So for next year, your 2022 diary is going to get full of stuff because you're going to be in massive demand again, so it will be Ibiza, festivals and touring again.

CRAIG: I'm going to be in Bournemouth really soon, that's going to be like a homecoming for me because I spent so much time obviously living on the South Coast. So to come and perform for the fans... it really feels like this tour...it's solid, it's locked in. I think in 2021, everything that was being booked in felt a bit wishy washy, like no one really knew exactly how it stood. Whereas now it feels like okay, we're going to have a proper Christmas this year. We're going to go out. We're going to festivals, we're going to come to the arena tour. We're going to have that, so I'm happy that everyone can

have some solid plans. Craig's new song 'Who You Are' is available now.



From Titanic to Dunkirk: RED FUNNEL CELEBRATES 160 YEARS

From supporting the Dunkirk evacuations to playing a significant role in the story of Titanic. Today Red Funnel's ships can be seen ferrying passengers to and from the Isle of Wight. But few know about the firm's involvement in two of the most iconic moments in history.

f the 930 vessels used to evacuate soldiers from the beaches of Dunkirk in 1940, 850 were little ships. At the time, Red Funnel owned six of those.

Perhaps the most famous of its vessels to take part in Operation Dynamo was paddle steamer Princess Elizabeth.

"She alone saved 1,673 souls from the beaches of Dunkirk," said Graham Barnetson, Chief Financial Officer at Red Funnel. "She is quite amazingly still in existence as a floating restaurant in Dunkirk harbour and can still be visited. She even had a role in Christopher Nolan's blockbuster film."

Not every vessel owned by Red Funnel made it home safely. On May 29, 1940, HMS Gracie Fields, which was was requisitioned the previous year, was hit by bombers as she was leaving La Panne beach.

"There were about 750 soldiers



aboard", Graham said. "The previous day she had rescued 281 soldiers and returned them to Margate. But she finally sank about five hours after on the morning of May 30. Most of those onboard her were saved and returned to the UK."

The operation lasted for ten days. Shortly after the end of World War Two, the firm bought another two of the ships which took part in the evacuation.

In total, the eight vessels linked to Red Funnel helped save almost 6,000 lives.

On what was the 80th anniversary of Dunkirk last year, the operator was presented with the little ships house flag and plaque to commemorate the role it played.

Red Funnel's mark on history dates back even further than Dunkirk. On April 3, 1912, five of the firm's tug boats guided the 269 metre-long RMS Titanic into berth in Southampton.

They were there again seven days later to tow her out of the docks as she set sail on her maiden voyage. Only five days later her tragic fate was sealed — but, as Graham explains, if it wasn't for the quick-

thinking of a Red Funnel captain, disaster could have struck much earlier.

"As she moved out of the docks she was so large the displacement of the water actually snapped the moorings of another liner in Southampton Harbour — an American line called New York.

"That liner began to drift towards

Titanic. A collision between those two vessels was narrowly avoided as the captain on one of Red Funnel's tugs — named Vulcan realised the danger ahead and managed to sufficiently slow the drift of the liner to stop a collision.

"Ône often wonders what

may have happened had that not had happened."

Of the 908 crew members on board Titanic, 724 of them were from Southampton. 549 of those did not make it back to the city.

This year marks 109 years since the sinking of the iconic ship. 2021 is also a landmark year for Red Funnel.

Having launched in 1861 as 'Southampton Isle of Wight and South of England Royal Mail Steam Packet Company Limited', the ferry firm is celebrating its 160th birthday.

Its ships have been providing a link to and from the mainland for over a century and a half —

making Red Funnel the Island's longest standing ferry
operator.
One of
its highlights includes welcoming
revellers to the Island for the first ever Isle of
Wight Festival in 1968, and for the next two events
in the following years.

"We've got some wonderful photos of festival-goers coming across on the vessels in 1968 — and we've

continued to bring them across since then, Graham said.

"I'm sure that we'll be around for a considerable period to come — and whilst I won't be here, the 320th anniversary

party will be quite incredible!"

KILF - the 'Keep Island Line in the Franchise' campaign - was formed six years ago when the route was under threat of being taken out of the wider regional franchise. Having campaigned since then to successfully save the route, we were of course both delighted to finally board the service on the new trains at 5:35am out of Ryde St John's Station to Ryde Pier Head. We then continued on the line for the first full journey through to Shanklin. The journey was not only much smoother, but the carriages are smart, modern and welcoming - along with the staff (as they have always been!). Island Line plays a crucial role for those living, working and visiting the East Wight corridor, including reaching the popular tourist destination of Shanklin. We both look forward to seeing many people arrive in our town over the months and years ahead.

GRITTING THE ISLAND ROADS UPDATE The Island Roads annual vehicle checks and safety briefings have already taken place as the company starts its preparations for its winter service. The 'Autumn Parade' as it is known, takes place every year at its Stag Lane depot, which is home to six frontline gritters, back up and specialist vehicles as well as the Island's road salt supply which provides an opportunity to test the fleet and brief drivers on the latest health and safety updates, and ensure they are familiar with the Island's gritting routes.

Each year the Island accrues 1,600 tonnes of graded rock salt, enough to cope with exceptionally severe winter weather. Gritting lorries are mobilised whenever freezing or close to zero temperatures are forecast, using special localised weather reports, readings from weather stations at Brading Down and on the Middle Road, as well as observational information. I was delighted and encouraged by the recent event in the Arcade in Union Street bringing together over 200 interested and committed residents to become Friends of Ryde Town Hall.

I met with delightful people, mingled and exchanged views with everyone who were absolutely dedicated and committed to seeing the Town Hall returned back to community use.

Glad to see our MP also turn up and I look forward to seeing how this can bring forward a positive solution for the building and for the town of Ryde.

On a similar note, it was great to see the Department, which is the old Packs store on Cross Street, get opened and with some substantial grant funding in place and a current bid awarded by the Arts Council of England a very bright future indeed lies ahead. Delivering a range of Arts and Cultural initiatives it is another example of how Ryde is leading the Island in so many ways.

Another example of investment in Ryde is the new Interchange scheme which is seeing £10m of grant funded money upgrade the public area, the station and the pier with work due to start at the beginning of 2022 and be finished by March 2023. Sir Paul McCartney Reveals Ticket to Ride Was Inspired by Isle of Wight

Sir Paul McCartney has revealed the role Ryde on the Isle of Wight played in inspiring The Beatles classic Ticket To Ride.

It's long been rumoured that a visit to the town gave Sir Paul and John Lennon the idea for the 1965 hit, but it has never been officially confirmed — until now.

Speaking at an event in London, Sir Paul recalled how he and John hitchhiked to the Island to see his cousin.

"My cousin Betty and her husband Mike Robbins were very influential on me. I would say to John on this occasion, lets hitch hike somewhere", said Sir Paul.

"He would play along so we ended up going down to the Isle of Wight, Ryde where they had a pub.

"They were always running pubs so they moved around Reading and various other places. So we wrote Ticket to Ride there with the play on words. Ryde was spelt R-Y-D-E and we spelt it ride."

Sir Paul was appearing at the Southbank Centre to discuss his new book 'The Lyrics: 1956 to the Present'.

He was answering a question put forward by presenter Samira Ahmed on behalf of Islander Jack Chase, from Ryde.

> Jack asked: "Growing up in Ryde on the Isle of Wight, can you talk a little bit about the influence that had on Ticket to Ride when

you hitchhiked here with John and any memories of the trip?"

Sir Paul reminisced about the trip to the Island — and his love for Betty and Mike.

He recalled how on one occasion the pair put The Beatles legends, who were both teenagers at the time, to bed.

Sir Paul said: "They were down in Ryde... the kind of lovely little memories. The things that stick out are the silly little things.

"This was me and John and they only have one guest room with one bed in it so me and John have to top and tail in this bed. We're lying there ready to go to bed and Bet and Mike would come in — they're grown ups.

"And even though we were in our late teens, they would tuck us in!"

Ticket to Ride was released as a single in April 1965.

It went on to become the Beatles' seventh consecutive number 1 hit in the United Kingdom, and their third consecutive number 1 hit in the United States.

Plans for New Quarry to Boost Island Building Trade

An application for a new quarry to supply essential construction materials to the local building trade to help safeguard scores of Island jobs, is being prepared for submission to Isle of Wight Council planners.

The application by Wight Building Materials (formerly Bardon Vectis) is to extract sand and gravel, in managed phases, from 12 hectares of agricultural land at Palmers Farm near Wootton.

Over a ten year period the site will be extracted and progressively restored. The company said a new site is vital to the future of Island sand and gravel supplies and without it, imports of sand and gravel will be required to maintain supply. The company added that is essential to the future of Wight Building Materials and its near 40-strong workforce. It is anticipated that the business' existing permitted reserves of sand and gravel on the Island will have been extracted by 2023

Wight Building Materials said: "The Palmers Farm site represents an important source of sand and gravel that will maintain a secure supply of construction materials to the Island's economy for the next 10 years. The site will be typically worked by just two vehicles during daylight hours only and not at weekends, nor bank holidays. There will be no processing of materials on - this will be done at the site company's established facility at St George's Down.

"There will be a maximum of 25 loads taken from the site daily via an improved access off Brocks Copse Road. A comprehensive traffic management plan to ensure traffic impacts are minimised will accompany the application with a commitment that no quarry vehicles will use Palmers Road."

Wight Building Materials plan, depending on successful determination, to start



quarrying activities in 2023 following the implementation of measures to reduce visual impact, minimise noise and to provide alternative habitat for wildlife.

In advance of the application, Wight Building Materials has held briefing meetings with Wootton residents and also will continue to liaise with neighbouring council ward members and other elected councillors.

Wight Building Materials General Manager, Steve Burton, said: "This new quarry is critical to the continued production of construction materials at St George's Down. Aggregates are the life blood of the business and sourcing sustainable, Island-won material reduces the need both for aggregates to be imported from the mainland and dredged from the sea.

"There are limited reserves of sand and gravel on the Island and this is one of the largest deposits still available for extraction. We are committed to do so responsibly, working with the local community."

Steve said that comprehensive species surveys have already been undertaken and the application will include an agreed programme to compensate for any habitat lost during quarrying with enhanced neighbouring habitats.

He added: "We have worked – and will continue to work throughout the project – to ensure we meet our environmental responsibilities. We will leave behind a more biodiverse area as demonstrated with our ongoing relationship with the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust at St George's Down."



News from Lake South

PLANNING APPEAL: Another appeal to the Planning Inspector has been made by WS Group, challenging the 2nd refusal of their application to build a large bungalow on the side on the Bridlepath SS24, adjacent to Broadlea School. The decision is expected in December, or early January, any last minute comments can still be made to the Planning Inspectorate. SHANKLIN CEMETERY: Thankfully the

SHANKLIN CEMETERY: Thankfully the vandalism at the cemetery, with gravestones being pulled over, seems to have stopped, but the police still have it on their rounds for regular patrols. Cemetery Road itself has many potholes but is finally going to be repaired by the IW Council, who are currently going through a procurement process.

I have also been dealing with properties adjacent to the cemetery whose fences are being damaged by overhanging trees. I am grateful to the Management Team of all IW Cemeteries who have been more than helpful to me in trying to sort out my residents' issues. **FAIRWAY ROAD JUNCTION:** For the last four years I have been raising concerns about the junction at the end of the Fairway, which in my opinion is one of the most dangerous junctions on the Island. As previously reported I had a meeting last month with Island Roads and the IW Council to look at what could realistically be done, within budget constraints to help the situation.

Traffic lights are not deemed to be a requirement, and it is not legally allowable to have a Yellow Box to be painted before a zebra crossing. As Tesco is private land, the council has no powers to require all traffic leaving their car park to turn left only.

What we have agreed is that improved signage of approaching zebra crossing is needed as you approach from Lake High Street; old plans recommended by Island Roads for some simple changes are to be revisited; and its important that all "near misses" or minor accidents for cars and pedestrians are reported to the police to create a true picture of the dangers there.

I am grateful to Tesco which has plans afoot to encourage their customers to exit by turning left out of their carpark.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES: There's been several occurrences of objects such as bottles and rocks thrown from the Cliff Path onto the revetment. We took this very seriously and immediately contacted the police, and the IW Council. Swift actions have resulted in regular inspections of the Cliff Path and thankfully there have been no more instances, and no one has been seriously hurt. I am grateful to other Parish Councillors who have assisted in this matter. If anything does happen further please report it to me, or the police. We have submitted our bid for £5,000

We have submitted our bid for £5,000 funding from the Government's post Covid initiative Fund and are still awaiting a response. We have agreed several ideas that we would like to fund from this aimed at brightening up several parts of Lake.

Setting up some forms of youth projects in Lake is an aim of the Parish Council, and alongside Sandown TC, we have worked with Community Action IOW to secure £10,000 funding for projects that were due to start in late November.

I recently had the pleasure of attending the opening of the "Prospero" and "Black Arrow" exhibition at the Wight Aviation Museum

at Sandown Airport. There is a full-sized replica of the Black Arrow rocket that was built on the Island largely by Island engineers, and tested at the site close to the New Battery at The Needles, before being shipped to Australia for launching. Prospero was the satellite that Black Arrow launched into space, and the satellite is still orbiting fifty years later. The museum has a fascinating selection of original documents and artefacts relating to this, and many other elements of aviation history on the Island; the museum is well worth a visit.

The Wight Aviation Museum is supported by a "Men in Sheds" group, and another group is based at Winchester House, the YMCA facility; last month I had the pleasure of opening their new Group Room, built to supplement the workshop they have operated there for some time. This voluntary group has carried out extensive renovation work at Winchester House, and has recently refurbished two of the park benches owned by the Town Council, for which we are very grateful. Men in Sheds provide community spaces for men to connect, converse and create, and are a great community asset as well as being a support and friendship group. New members are always welcome.

On Remembrance Sunday I attended the Remembrance Ceremony at St Thomas' Square in Newport, and laid a wreath on behalf of Shanklin, before joining the Remembrance Sunday Service at the Minster. 





The Care Cap: Is it as good as it sounds?

adly, there is no clear reference in the government's plan 'for health and social care' as to what the care cap covers. It was subsequently confirmed that the accommodation-related costs of care those associated with daily living, such as; food, energy bills and the physical building — would not count towards the cap.

When the Government was considering a care cap five years ago, they had indicated that the cost of the accommodation-related costs would be in the region of £12,000 per annum (£230 per week). Given that the care cap at that time was going to be £72,000 and now it has increased to £86,000, it is likely that this accommodation cost will also be higher.

Using the figure of $\pounds 12,000$ a year, if the cost of your care is $\pounds 650$ a week, you will be expected to pay $\pounds 230$ per week towards 'board and lodging' and the amount accruing to reach the cap would You may have seen that from October 2023, there will be a lifetime cap of £86,000 for the cost of a person's care. The premise is that every individual requiring care will pay a maximum of £86,000 for their care in their lifetime – sounds good doesn't it?

be \pounds 420 per week.

In other words, to get to the cap of $\pounds 86,000$ you will have to pay for care for 205 weeks ($\pounds 420 \ge 205 = \pounds 86,100.00$) but the actual amount that you would have spent would be $\pounds 133,250.00$ (including board and lodging).

The Government is also looking at changing the upper thresholds for care; currently, if you have assets of over £23,250 (including property unless there is a property disregard) then you will be liable to fund all of your care. When you dip between £14,250 and £23,250 then you pay a contribution from your capital and below £14,250 then you do not use your capital to pay for your care. The new rules would see people with over £100,000 paying for care in full until they either reach the cap of their assets drop below £100,000. There would be a charge on capital for those with assets between £20,000 and £100,000. People with less than £20,000 would have to contribute from their income towards their care costs but not from their savings.

Whilst this would be better than the current system of being left with just \pounds 14,250, it does mean that some people will still spend a huge amount of their money to pay for care.

Planning for the future is therefore very important and there may be options available to you in your Wills which can protect your assets for your future generations. ③

Jeck the Halls

The tradition of celebrating midwinter by decorating houses and gardens with greenery dates back thousands of years. Hanna Prince delves into the fascinating history of festive decorations.

hether it's a sprig of mistletoe hanging from the ceiling, a tree

in the corner or a wreath on the front door, most of us mark Christmas by decorating our houses with greenery. This age-old tradition predates Christmas times by at least 500 years – descriptions of Saturnalia, the Roman midwinter festival, suggest that people were hanging up wreaths and other evergreen sprigs to celebrate the winter solstice from the 5th century AD, perhaps even earlier.

MISTLETOE

Next time you snatch a festive kiss under the mistletoe, bear in mind that you're participating in a ritual that dates back to 1st century Celtic Druids. Because the plant blossomed in the frozen winter, Druids came to associate it with fertility. Mistletoe's reputation as a symbol of love continued into the Middle Ages – in 13th century Norse mythology, the goddess Frigg vows to plant a kiss on all those that passed beneath it. Our modern tradition of kissing beneath the mistletoe at Christmas probably began in the 18th century, when men were permitted to snatch a kiss from any woman found standing beneath it.

WREATHS

Wreaths have been a symbol of celebration since the days of ancient Rome, when they were worn by women as a symbol of pride and awarded to victorious athletes. In 4th century Turkey, a Christian bishop complained about his congregation 'crowning their doors' with greenery at Christmas – an act he considered to be clearly Pagan. But it wasn't long until wreath-hanging was incorporated into the festive tradition. In the 6th century, Pope Gregory the Great recommended that the Pagan customs be annexed at Christmas by focusing the hanging of greenery on churches.

HOLLY AND IVY

Deck the Halls with Boughs of Holly may not have been published until 1862, but festive songs mentioning holly and ivy were being sung in England from the 15th

century. King Henry VIII wrote his own carol, Green Groweth the Holly, and in 1558 the poet Thomas Tusser wrote a song opening: 'Get ivy and hull [holly] woman, deck up thine house.'

These carols may have been Christian in intent, but the symbolism they invoke is much older. Centuries before the birth of Jesus, Pagans were using holly (the 'male' plant) and ivy (the 'female') to ward off evil spirits and celebrate new growth during the winter solstice celebrations.

CHRISTMAS TREES

No greenery is more closely associated with Christmas than the Christmas tree but, compared to many festive traditions. this one is actually relatively recent. The first mention of Christmas trees comes from 16th century Rhineland, and it wasn't until the early 19th century that they really began to catch on in Britain. Queen Victoria and her husband Prince Albert were big fans of the tradition. By the end of the 19th century the trend had spread across Britain, and Christmas cards depicting trees as part of the festive scene were common. Today one of the most famous Christmas trees in Britain is the one in Trafalgar Square, which is gifted annually by the people of Norway as a symbol of peace and goodwill following the Second World War. 3
