

INGREDIENTS

8 thin biscuits 4 squares of thin milk chocolate 8 marshmallows

METHOD

Sandwich two marshmallows and one square of chocolate between two biscuits and wrap tightly in tin foil.

2 Carefully warm the parcel over the bonfire, using tongs, or a cooking rack, for one to two minutes.

Carefully unfold and enjoy, being careful it's not too hot to burn your mouth.

If you're not having a bonfire this year, simply pop the parcels in the oven instead.



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



Stir Up Sunday

Stir-up Sunday is a Victorian tradition where the family would gather together to stir the Christmas pudding mixture five weeks before Christmas, or the last Sunday before advent begins.

This recipe, by Mary Goodsell, is a family favourite which evokes fond nostalgic memories.

20[™]

NOVEMBER

INGREDIENTS

Butter, to grease $100g (3\frac{1}{2}oz)$ raisins 50g (2oz) dried cranberries $125g (4\frac{1}{2}oz)$ sultanas 125g (4½oz) prunes, chopped 25g (loz) chopped mixed peel 50ml (2fl oz) fresh orange juice, plus finely grated zest 1 orange 100ml (3½fl oz) Cointreau or brandy 50g (2oz) plain flour 50g (2oz) breadcrumbs 1 large eating apple, peeled, cored and finely chopped 2 tsps ground cinnamon 1 tbsp mixed spice 110g (4oz) dark brown soft sugar 1 large egg, beaten 25g (loz) vegetarian suet

METHOD

Place all of the dried fruit into a ceramic or glass bowl with the Cointreau or brandy, orange zest and juice. Cover and leave to soak overnight.

2 Add all of the remaining ingredients, apart from the butter to the bowl and stir well. This is when the family can all join in and each have a stir.

3 Use the butter to grease a 1.2 litre/2 pint pudding basin and line with a 61cm (24in) piece of muslin. Spoon the mix into the lined basin, pack it down firmly as you go, and level the top. Pull the sides of the muslin around the pudding and secure tightly with string.


Tie string around the basin just under the rim and knot to secure. Then make a handle by bringing the ends of the string over the top of the bowl and tying them to the string on the other side.

5 To cook, put an upturned saucer into a deep pan and then place the basin on top of the saucer. Pour in enough water to reach just over halfway up the sides of the basin,

then cover and bring to a simmer. Cook for 6 hours. Make sure the pan never boils dry by topping it up with boiling water as necessary.

Remove the pudding from the pan and leave it to cool. Lift it out of the basin, keeping it in its muslin cloth, then wrap in clingfilm and a double layer of kitchen foil. Store in a cool dark place. The pudding will keep for up to one year if wrapped tightly.

To reheat: return the pudding, still in its muslin, to the pudding basin. Follow the cooking instructions from step 5, but only for two hours, or until hot right through.

For too long we have experienced this continual up and down shift of prices and supply and tariffs and everything else that, as consumers, drivés us bonkers.

The reality of what we have and what's going on right now has been brewing for a long time. All of the policies being put in place are trying to restrict future government liability, and I don't think we've done it the right way. I think we're doing it at the cost of consumers.

The workforce has risen from the original team of three to well over 150 — many staff having worked with the company for more than 25 years.



VENTNOR SEAWEED COSTS RISE TO MORE THAN £100K PER YEAR

The staggering amount it costs the Isle of Wight Council to remove seaweed from Ventnor Harbour has risen once again.

The authority has put the 18 per cent increase down to the rise in costs witnessed across all council contracts but it has pushed the bill over £100.000.

Since the harbour was built in 1994, it has suffered from the constant presence of seaweed that comes in from the English Channel.

However, to maintain harbour depth and get rid of smells, the Isle of Wight Council, which owns the harbour, has to remove the build-up of seaweed.

To do this, the authority has contracted the work to Ventnor business Cheetah Marine, for the past few years.

In the 2019/20 financial year, the contract cost the Isle of Wight Council £75,120, which rose by £12,000 for 2020/21 and

2021/22 to £87,420 a year.

Now, with prices rising for everyone, the cost of the contract, which started in April and will run until the end of March 2023, has increased again to £103,155 a year a rise of £28,000 in three years.

The council's harbour committee did look at the possible alternative uses of seaweed in Ventnor Harbour. and other areas leased or owned by the authority, but there was no budget at the time to take any of the actions forward.

As part of the contract costs in the current 2022/23 financial year, the council has given a £40,000 'contribution' to Cheetah Marine.

A council spokesperson said it would go towards vessel refurbishment.

As part of the future of Ventnor Harbour, the Isle of Wight Council is proposing to bring in a management company that will carry the cost of the seaweed removal in later years.

SHANKLIN RETURN NOT RULED **OUT FOR SEASIDE TRAIN**

The return of a Dotto train in Shanklin has not been ruled out – although caution has been voiced by a top councillor.

The iconic vehicle has been absent from the town for more than ten years now but with renewed interest in one for Ryde, Shanklin has been looking at whether it would be a good idea to get one back on its

The matter was raised at last week's Shanklin Town Council meeting.

Shanklin mayor, Cllr Chris Quirk, said: "The one in Shanklin made a decent profit, the one in Sandown broke even and the one in Ryde which was a Dotto train, made a thumping great loss every year which is why they got rid of it.

"What was disappointing was that the Isle of Wight Council insisted on selling all three as a job lot."

Cllr Quirk said it was something the town council could consider but he was not sure a public authority was the right body to be running a

He said: "It is a good private enterprise we can encourage and help, rather than committing ratepayers' money.

"I don't think this is a good time to put up precepts to buy a Dotto train but we can think of it."

Dotto trains were scrapped on the Island in 2010 by the Isle of Wight Council as the ageing vehicles meant increased maintenance costs.

At the time, the authority did look at replacing the trains with either new or refurbished ones but was looking at a price tag of more than £100,000 per train.

It was deemed unviable and the Island's bus operator, Southern Vectis introduced a new summer route covering as much of the Dotto train routes as possible.

Despite interest in bringing back the trains, including bids from local companies, the council sold the three vehicles to a businessman in Llandudno.

The council said it had accepted the best offer.

COPSE MEAD: Works are now happening at the Mead at the end of the growing and nesting season. The main initial efforts will be the hedge cutting which will happen this autumn. It may initially look severe because there is an urgent need to catch up the lost ground. Throughout, good ecological best practise will be adopted.

There will also be a lot of autumn mechanical grass cutting. Going forward the idea is still for conservation grazing to take place which hopefully will remove the need for mechanical cutting. There will also be the clearing of the boundary and reduce, but not completely remove, the bramble and scrub

SANDOWN AND LAKE YOUTH FOOTBALL CLUB: The club continues to grow for the benefit of our local young people, run by so many great volunteers, and I am very pleased they have now acquired a further pitch at the bottom of the old Sandham Middle School site, on a long lease from the IW Council. In September I held a meeting with the club, and Hampshire Football Association, and there are several funding streams they qualify for, and applications are underway. There is an exciting future for the club. Their longer term aim now is to include girls and disabled teams

FAIRWAY JUNCTION AND FAIRWAY: This junction continues to be a huge concern, alongside speeding along The Fairway, and it really is time for action. I have again chased the Cabinet Member who is still

waiting for police data on reported incidents at the junction, but in my view it should not be all about data when safety is concerned. That said I urge everyone to report to police any accidents or near misses, as that will really help make the case even stronger.

POLICE: There have been lots of issues of concern this summer on three main areas. drugs; toilet vandalism; and items being thrown over the cliff onto the Revetment across the whole Bay area. In September I facilitated the inaugural meeting of the three Bay councils which was very useful. We sent a request to the Police & Crime Commissioner that we want an urgent meeting to discuss these matters, and I hope this will happen in November.

LAKE TOILETS: This year the Council arranged for Revetment toilets to have major refurbishments. In October we had installed a new set of toilets in Lake Cliff Gardens to replace the existing building that was no longer fit for purpose. The Council is now consulting on upgrading the toilets at New Road, which will also see a large reduction in our water and electric bills, as well as hopefully less vandalism and repair costs.

REMEMBRANCE: Lake will be holding its Remembrance Service on Sunday the 13th November at 2.30pm, at the War Memorial. This years' service will be very personal to residents of Lake.

SHANKLIN RAILWAY STATION: Shanklin Kallway Station: Shanklin Station, part of the South Western Railway (SWR) and Island Line network has deservedly won 'Station of the Year – (Small)' at the prestigious National Rail Awards last month. Part of the criteria that judges had to consider were factors including infrastructure, safety, presentation. customer-friendly The station was originally built in 1864 for the Isle of Wight Railway and extended in 1881. It has a heritage category listed building grade II status and it triumphed over highly commended Buxton station in Derbyshire, Hatch End station in North West London, and other submissions to win the award in its category. SWR's Island Line between Ryde Pierhead and Shanklin reopened in November 2021 following a £26 million transformation of the line's trains, stations, and infrastructure, which included the launch of the new Class 484 train fleet. Part of the external charm of the station, is its array of attractive large flower boxes meticulously maintained by the Green Towns Shanklin Volunteers group. Following a successful bid in 2019 to SWR by the Shanklin Theatre Community Trust, a large digital display screen has been affixed to the front of the station displaying train, bus timetables and other local information. This information is linked to a second display screen at the newly developing Performing Arts Centre (former old library) in

Victoria Avenue – Shanklin.

SHANKLIN PERFORMING ARTS
CENTRE UPDATE: Following a spate of anti-social behaviour and un-authorised vehicle parking in and around the Arts Centre, as Trustees of the Shanklin Theatre, we decided to improve the security and remote monitoring of the building and area to deter such activities. The Centre has now been equipped with high

resolution CCTV cameras installed at strategic locations to ensure the property is monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This will also help to protect our volunteers and user groups. Our thanks go to the team at Lifeline Alarm Systems for carrying out the installation work. We are also extremely delighted to announce, that after following a successful funding application to the Co-op, the Arts Centre has been chosen to be part of the next round of the Co-op Local Community Fund. The funding round started on Sunday 23rd October 2022 and will run for 12 months until 21st October 2023. During this time, Co-op Members will be able to select the Performing Arts Centre as their cause and help us raise funds for internal equipment such as, clothes lockers, audio and lighting equipment and an electric piano to aid our dance, performance and user groups. NEW SHANKLIN TOILETS TO BE LOCATED NEAR CLIFF LIFT

New public toilets on Shanklin seafront will now be placed in a different location.

Plans had been put in place by Shanklin Town Council (STC) to place payas-you-go toilets by Chine Bluff.

As an alternative, STC has now agreed to place the facilities – which will have two toilets and two exterior cold water showers – by the bottom of the Shanklin Cliff Lift.

The existing toilets at the SPA site have been closed for a number of years, with Cllr Quirk saying the town council had wanted to install public toilets there

A structural survey is being completed of the existing Chine Bluff toilets so the council can agree on what to do with them.

Cllr Quirk said there had been suggestions refurbishment work would

Town Mayor's address

Councillor Chris Quirk, Shanklin Town Mayor

Following Shanklin's Gold Award for Bathing Water

Quality and our award for 'Best Toilets' the Island Line/South Western Railway's Shanklin station has succeeded in winning an award at the prestigious National Rail Awards, winning in the small stations category. Our thanks to Shanklin Green Towns, whose input maintaining the gardens, planters and hanging baskets helped to create the welcoming appearance of the station.

For some time now Shanklin Town Council has been upgrading its toilet facilities, already having carried out major renovations at Falcon Cross, Tower Gardens and on the Esplanade at the bottom of Hope Hill. The next planned phases were to add a new stand-alone toilet block, including disabled facilities and outside showers, almost opposite the existing toilets at Chine Bluff on land kindly offered by Mrs Ann Springman, and a unit adjacent to the Cliff Lift, hopefully to be funded by Section 106 funding linked to the development of the Spa site.


Unfortunately Southern Water objected to the Chine Bluff location as the building was a few inches too close to an underground sewer. Since we had already paid a deposit on the unit, and it was already constructed we agreed with the IW Council to install the unit adjacent to the base of the cliff lift, and to request Section 106 funding for improvements to the existing facilities at Chine Bluff. The Town Council has commissioned a full structural survey of the current Art Deco Toilet Block at Chine Bluff.

When the problem of the positioning of the toilet block became known the engineers from the supplier looked at the nearest available site on the Esplanade, causing some anxiety to local residents; this was carried out prior to consultation with Town Councillors who supported the view that the Esplanade Site was unsuitable. To reassure local residents, I can confirm that no toilets are planned to be installed directly on the Esplanade.

The work on the Big Mead Pond is now completed, the water flow though the pond reestablished, with the Island now boasting duck

nesting huts and replanted without the mass of brambles that had overwhelmed it. The pond is now a metre or more deep in many parts, and the ducks and moorhens have returned to the pond, and the Carp will be returned in the near future. We plan to add a blue die next season to stop algal growth, this is totally harmless to wildlife and

At the last Town Council Meeting the desirability of restoring a Dotto Train in Shanklin. In reality 'Dotto Train' is a brand name used to describe all land trains just as the brand name 'Jacuzzi' is used to describe a wide range of spa baths. The land train that operated previously in Shanklin was based on a Land Rover chassis with adapted bodywork and was profitable; the real Dotto Train operated in Ryde made a loss, in part at least because of the much higher maintenance costs involved with a specialist vehicle. Bids were made at the time from the Shanklin Hoteliers Association and a local businessman, but although a reasonable bid was lodged the Council Officer involved insisted on selling the three Island land trains as a single lot. Whilst Town Councillors would support a commercial enterprise to run a land train, increasing our precept to purchase on does not seem to be justified in the current financial climate.









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

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

When should a person be assessed?

HS Continuing Healthcare (CHC) is an NHS-funded package of ongoing care. To qualify for NHS CHC funding, an individual must have ongoing significant physical and/or mental health needs, and, having taken account of those needs, it can be said that the main aspects or majority part of the care you need is focused on addressing and/or preventing health needs.

It is not enough to have a social need (things like practical activities, personal care and making sure a person is safe), a person must also have a health need to

Initially an individual is assessed by a heath care professional using a government CHC checklist. This then confirms whether a person is eligible for a full continuing care assessment.

The full assessment is then completed by a multidisciplinary team (MDT) made up of a minimum of two professionals

from different healthcare professions. The MDT should usually include both health and social care professionals who are already involved in your care. You, as the person being assessed, should know and be involved in that assessment.

WHEN SHOULD A CHC CHECKLIST BE COMPLETED?

In a hospital setting a CHC checklist should automatically be completed when an individual is ready for discharge from hospital prior to a local authority funding assessment or, as was happening during COVID, shortly after discharge.

If a person is moving into residential care from a home setting then you can request that a checklist is completed prior to that move. GPs, nurses and social workers should be able to complete this checklist at any time.

You can also request further CHC checklists if your health deteriorates after having an initial assessment.

You should be told when it is being completed and you should always be involved in the assessment.

WHY HAVEN'T I HEARD ABOUT THIS BEFORE?

Research by the Continuing Healthcare Alliance (a group of 13 organisations who believe NHS continuing healthcare needs to improve) shows that 60% of people they surveyed did not know about this funding until very late in their dealings with social and health care services.

Checklists don't always appear to be completed and, if they are, people are not informed of the outcome meaning they don't have the ability to appeal the decisions made within them.

We also recommend that you seek legal advice before your loved one is discharged from hospital or on going into residential care so that you can make sure that procedures are followed and all avenues for funding are explored. 3

Also, a minibus takes residents to different locations each week. Available apartments are situated on the first, second and third floor with lift access to all floors as well as stairs.

Assisted bathrooms are available if needed. These are situated throughout the building. There are also guest suites if visitors wish to stay overnight and prefer to have their own suite rather than staying in an apartment, these can be reserved at a small cost.

RECEPTION

Located as you enter the

building is a small seating area with communal hot drink facilities, communal disabled WCs, scheme shop, hairdressers and mobility scooter storage. The reception desk supports residents and visitors when required.

TWO-BEDROOM **APARTMENTS ENTRANCE HALL**

Upon entering the apartments there is a spacious entrance hall with storage and access to the bathroom, both bedrooms and to the kitchen/lounge.

KITCHEN/LOUNGE

OUTSIDE

A large car park for residents and visitors with disabled bays is located at the front of the building. Communal areas with outdoor seating facilities accessible through double doors from the communal dining area or through gated side access. 3

Berry nice indeed

Warming those winter garden vistas with some bursts of festive colour.

e all know the colours and the coldness of winter when it comes to gardening. Many of us regard it as a season reserved only for planning the dawning of spring when luscious life can return to our outside spaces.

And yet, winter can be about much more than greens, browns and greys where gardens are concerned.

With that in mind then, here are some plants that will help keep things lively:

COTONEASTER

Don't be deceived by the name, this shrub is very much a winter dweller, and boasts red or yellow berries that will keep birds in your garden even when the frost descends.

The Cotoneaster does have a reputation for spreading fast, not so much because it's a back garden bully that can't be trusted; more by way of birds scattering the seed all around.

If you can deal with little pockets of colour popping up – and why shouldn't you? – then this is a beautiful plant for weary winter wonderlands.

SORBUS

In white, pink, yellow, red, blue and quite the most

stunning copper tones, the berries from this deciduous tree will bring breathless colour to even the darkest corner.

With over 100 species of tree and shrub making up the family, you won't be short of choice or subtlety, with each growing to around six metres tall, and lasting for between 10-20 years.

HOLLY

A Christmas favourite, holly combines a burning red berry with that intensely detailed,

Perhaps the most resplendent winter berry that we know, though for all its festive connotations, it's sure to stick around for many months of magic.

CALLICARPA

This shrub has purple jewellike berries that look as if they've come straight from a safe deposit box in Hatton Garden. An intensely rich shade, the plant goes into overdrive in autumn and winter, progressing from small pink flowers in midsummer to an exaggerated and extroverted array of striking, violet, bead-like berries as the months flick by.

Thus, the Callicarpa is guaranteed to offer colour to even the gloomiest garden.

VIBURNUM TINUS

In its prime between the months of December to April, just when you think the golden pink buds of this characterful

plant can't offer anything more, the ends burst open offering a spray of white flowers.

One of the first risers for

spring's sumptuous season of colour, the Viburnum Tinus will soar in prominences just as the temperatures begin to do likewise, lifting your outside space into sparkling spring finesse.

And if the beauty of the winter rebels wasn't a pleasure enough to see, the range of birds they will attract to your garden will only serve to delight you further. ③
