Linton on Ouse Action Group Stand up to Racism

Public meeting to discuss the refugee processing facility at Linton on Ouse oin York Stand up to Racism, local refugee groups, activists and community leaders as we discuss the Tories' proposed 'refugee processing facility' at Linton on Ouse. We say that all refugees are welcome in the UK – don't let the racists divide us.

The previous RAF facility is unsuitable and the local area does not have adequate facilities for the 1,500 refugees.

They should be in good accommodation where they can access public transport and services. They should feel welcomed into communities where they can become part of local life.

The processing facility at Linton on Ouse amounts to a detention camp where people will wait for an indefinite length of time to have asylum claims processed.

Join us on 17 June to discuss what local York activists and those in Linton on Ouse can do about these plans.

Hostile environment

The government has intensified their racist 'Hostile Environment' by unveiling plans for offshore detention in Rwanda.

This heinous plan comes as the Nationality and Borders Act (NABA) has been passed, despite significant opposition.

The processing facility at Linton on Ouse is part of the government's wider plan and racist strategy for refugees.



The NABA creates two tiers of 'deserving' and 'undeserving' people seeking asylum based on imaginary 'legal' routes.

Stop the scapegoating

The government is desperate to divert attention from their Covid failings, illegal parties and a cost of living crisis.

We must say loud and clear that refugees and migrants are not to blame – and that all refugees are welcome here.

The establishment claim Britain has been too welcoming, and is now overwhelmed. But the truth is 86% of refugees live in countries neighbouring their country of origin.

The NABA represents a significant attack on human rights in removing the ability to claim asylum for all but those arriving via the official 'legal' routes.

Stand Up To Racism calls for the scrapping of the NABA and the rapid expansion of safe and legal routes for refugees to enter the UK and claim asylum.
